## President's Message

As we commence the new Olympic Quadrennial in 2013, I reflect on the past years and what we have achieved. However we are still faced with many challenges and a lot of work to be done with the 2015 Pacific Games being the catalyst for change and major developments for sport in PNG.

Symbolical during the new Quadrennial, was the name change with an official launching of our new logo and name, the Papua New Guinea Olympic Committee (PNGOC) with the passing into history of the former "Papua New Guinea Sports Federation & Olympic Committee" (PNGSFOC).

The highlight of the year was undoubtedly Team PNG's successful performance at the 2013 Pacific Mini Games finishing on top of the medal tally with 30 gold, 26 silver and 31 bronze medals. This is an outstanding achievement and congratulations to the athletes and the management team led by Chef de Mission, Richard Kassman.

I am sure that these performances by individuals and teams provide the inspiration and motivation for athletes vying for the 2015 Pacific Games.

Halfway into the plan, 2013 herald increased support to Athletes under the Government funded 'Go for Gold' (G4G) program and setting up of the high performance division.

## Secretary General's Overview

The past twelve months have been marked by some significant achievements along with a fair share of challenges as we completed the third year of our current strategic plan period.

The focus of our attention during the year was to establish a High Performance Program with a structure and system that provides support services and monitoring of athletes performance.

The Government has been the major contributor in funding the Go for Gold (G4G) Program to prepare Team PNG for the 2015 Pacific Games. As the organization responsible for the sustainability of our elite top performing athletes, the valuable increase in funding by the Government has obviously demanded a corresponding increase in our capacity to deliver and manage our programs while providing direct focused support to the National Federations.

Recognizing this increase in funding by the Government, key emphasis has been placed on ensuring that we properly account and acquit for the funds utilized to ensure continuous Government support and flow of funds to support our teams. I am pleased to report that the G4G Committee fully acquitted and reported on the activities for 2013.

Despite the set back and delay in release of G4G funding in the first part of the year, results of our sports at international competitions have been promising as exemplified by Team PNG finishing first on the medal table at the 2013 Pacific Mini-Games in Wallis & Futuna.

However, complacency cannot be allowed to set in the final run in to the 2015 Pacific Games and so the continued support to sports on strategic and high value preparation activities is a priority. The addition of monitoring and evaluation of sports' preparations through the High Performance Program is a vital element of the success of G4G and ultimately Team PNG.

Among the highlights of the year was the PNG Athletes Commission's "Love your Coast" Program that won the IOC Sport and Environment Award for Oceania. We celebrate that achievement. The Commission is well represented on the Executive Board and Committees and plays an active role in all our activities. It is through this involvement, it is able to contribute to a variety of areas that directly influence the welfare of current athletes.

As a lead up and curtain raiser to the Glasgow Commonwealth Games, the Queens Baton was relayed through Port Moresby on 5th November and on 6th November in Kavieng, New Ireland. We acknowledge the support of Minister for Sports, UNICEF, British High Commission, NCDC, New Ireland Provincial Government, Newcrest Ltd and the various support sponsors for their contribution to the success of the event.

We continued to access Olympic Solidarity funding to support our athletes and officials under the various programmes with priority on athletes targeted for the 2016 Rio Olympic Games and support to non-2015 Pacific Games sports.

## SECRETARY GENERAL'S OVERVIEW

Women in Sport program picked up momentum with Deputy Chairperson of the Athletes Commission, Karo Lelai selected as one of twenty women from around the world to be part of the espnW supported Global Sports Mentoring Program with a one month attachment to the WNBA. Our female members of Team PNG continued to dominate Team PNG's gold medal haul, winning 56% of gold medals for PNG at the Pacific Mini-Games.

We have been extremely fortunate to have the on-going support of our family of Corporate Sponsors in renewing their partnership with PNGOC. Without their support we would not have achieved our objectives for the year.

Our fundraising events received overwhelming support by the corporate sector and participation of the Prime Minister, Hon. Peter O'Neil in the Prime Minister's Corporate Golf Challenge and Trukai Fun Run.

The SP Sports Awards has grown into a premier sporting event recognising the achievements of our sportsmen and women, and I take this opportunity to acknowledge SP Brewery for its long-standing partnership since the inception in 1992. We recognize the partnership with National Federations is key to our success. They are our clients and the delivery agents for sport in this country. Our vision and goals can only be achieved through alignment and partnership with them to ensure we provide the best environment and support for our athletes to excel.

We value the relationship and constructive feedback from National Federations as important for us to improve our services and better respond to their needs. 2013 has been a year of trial and error with the full roll out of the G4G Program, and I wish to thank the National Federations for their understanding and perseverance as we developed and implemented policies and procedures on funding arrangements to ensure we complied with Government reporting and accounting practice.

The work of the Secretariat continues to grow at a rapid rate and our staff has answered the challenge with the support of the Executive Board and Sub-Committees. I would like to record my appreciation to each and every one of our staff for their tremendous dedication and commitment. The Secretariat has been well supported and led by a competent and active group of members on our Executive Board and I wish to acknowledge their contribution and leadership.

These are challenging times but opportunities continue to abound. It is up to us to rise to the occasion, best wishes for 2014!

## Papua New Guinea Olympic Committee Inc. Secretariat Report

The beginning of a new Olympic Quadrennial in 2013 saw the official launching of our new name, the Papua New Guinea Olympic Committee (PNGOC) and logo. With two years to go before the 2015 Pacific Games, 2013 also marked the halfway point of our current strategic plan period; and our current strategic plan maxim “2015 – In Pursuit of Excellence” which guided the work carried out by the Secretariat throughout the year.



### Team PNG

#### Wallis & Futuna IX Pacific Mini-Games

The year saw the focus of Team PNG centred on the 2013 Wallis & Futuna Pacific Mini-Games held from September 2nd to the 12th. With nineteen other countries and territories taking part, the ninth Pacific Mini-Games were viewed as a vital opportunity for Team PNG to compete against fellow Pacific Islanders in the lead-up to the 2015 Pacific Games and so Chef de Mission Richard Kassman led a large team consisting of athletes in all eight sports on the games program to take part in the games. Sapolai Yao was given the honour of being the flag bearer for Team PNG and led the 186 athletes and officials of the PNG contingent at the opening ceremony.

The team’s performance at the end of the ten days of competition justified the

money spent on sending a large team to Wallis & Futuna as Team PNG finished first on the medal table

with 30 gold medals, 26 silver and 31 bronze for a total of 87 medals. Our Athletics team provided the majority of our medals with 15 Gold, 11 Silver and 10 Bronze. Betty Burua was Team PNG's leading performer, winning a total of 5 Gold Medals on the track. Toea Wisil won 4 Gold and 1 Silver and Mowen Boino won 2 Gold and 1 Silver. Our Weightlifting team did exceptionally well winning a total of 13 Gold medals with Steven Kari and sister Rita Kari each walking away with 3 Golds each. Morea Baru also won 3 Gold, with Guba Hale and Toua Udia winning 2 gold and 1 silver each. In Taekwondo, two-time Olympian Theresa Tona was the lone gold medallist and our Va'a team came back with medals, including three silvers for members on the female crew.

Sailing also produced a medal winning effort by getting two bronze medals in the team events and silver and bronze medals were also claimed by our women's and men's teams respectively in Beach Volleyball. The games culminated in memorable performance by our men's Volleyball Team who won PNG's first Pacific Games volleyball gold at against home favourites Wallis & Futuna in an amazing final.

The team left the Pacific Mini Games encouraged by its performances and grateful to the people of Wallis & Futuna for the hospitality shown. Team PNG will look to build on their 2013 performance as it prepares for the 2015 Pacific Games.

The efforts of Team PNG were rewarded by the government of PNG when Prime Minister Peter O'Neill announced at the Welcome for Team PNG held on September 14th, a monetary reward of K500,000 was to be paid to members of the Team in recognition of the fine performance. Medal winning athletes were also rewarded by the Institute of Business Studies.



## **Team PNG Other Developments**

The PNGOC developed a Team PNG Officials Selection policy which was adopted in 2013 by the PNGOC Executive Board and shared with sports to provide guidance on the selection of officials for the 2015 Pacific Games Team PNG. The selection policy also outlined criteria to be used as the basis for officials' selection and endorsement with the aim of ensuring Team PNG officials selected are the appropriate individuals to guide our athletes to success in 2015.

As part of efforts to develop the capacity of those involved with preparing Team PNG athletes, a Sports Psychology Workshop for National Coaches, was held in September, 2013. It was facilitated by Dr Michelle Pain, an Australian sport psychologist with 25 years' experience working with athletes and coaches in a range of sports. Participants were taken through theoretical sessions with activities which included the evolution of sports psychology and some of the key concepts involved with preparing athletes for elite performance.

## **Sports Programs**

Work through our various sports programmes continued in 2013, with the implementation of Olympic Solidarity Program, Women in Sport, Athletes Commission, Sport and Environment, Sports HIV Committee, PNG Sports Anti-Doping Organisation and Go for Gold Programme.

## **Olympic Solidarity**

Entering into a new quadrennial of Olympic Solidarity funding in 2013, PNGOC looked to strategize how we would utilize the support received through the Olympic Solidarity Program.



Funds from the Olympic Solidarity National Activity Continental Programme were used to support Judo attend the Oceania Championships and run a coaching and talent identification clinic; Table Tennis stage a coaching clinic prior to their National Championships and send their number one athlete to an Oceania talent team training camp in Singapore; Taekwondo send their premier athlete to Australia to compete in an invitational tournament; Weightlifting attend the Commonwealth

Championships in Malaysia; Football hold a training camp for their women's national team; Swimming send two of their targeted athletes for the Youth Olympic Games to Brisbane for a training camp; and Athletics' elite athletes based in Australia with their high performance training program. Judo, Basketball, Volleyball, Rugby 7s and Swimming all benefited with support for equipment from the Olympic Solidarity Equipment Grant Continental Programme. The PNGOC also accessed funding from Olympic Solidarity Olympic Scholarship for Coaches World Programme to support PNG Weightlifter Dika Toua undertake and successfully complete a year-long regional coaching diploma at the Oceania Weightlifting Institute. The Environmental Sustainability in Sport World Programme provided funding support for activities conducted in 2013 under our Love Your Coast Sport & Environment program and assisted the programme's representative attend the 10<sup>th</sup> World Conference for Sport and Environment in Sochi. Olympic Solidarity funding was also used to support the participation of two PNGOC staff in professional development with Loretta Hasu taking part in the MOSO programme offered by OSEP in 2013 and Andrew Lepani completing MEMOS XVI.


## Go for Gold Program

The twenty-eight sports on the 2015 Pacific Games sports programme were supported through the Government funded Go for Gold programme, which provides funding to assist in the strategic preparation of athletes and officials for the games. 2013 saw the first full year of delivery for G4G and subsequently an increase in activities funded and carried out by National Federations. The release of 2013 G4G funds directly to the PNGOC from the 2015 Pacific Games Authority (PGA) did not happen until August, 2013. Prior to this, G4G payments were carried out through the Department of Finance and PNG Sports Foundation (PNGSF) administered Government 2015 Pacific Games Subsidiary Trust Account.

The 2015 Pacific Games Authority transferred a total of K7,082,400 to the PNGOC for G4G in 2013. Expenditure of this funding through G4G during 2013 totalled just over K 3.9 million. G4G funding was used to support national championships, secure the services of expert coaches, stage training camps, develop the capacity of officials, attend international competitions including costs associated with Team PNG's participation at the 2013 Wallis & Futuna Pacific Mini-Games, engage sports development officers, engage a High Performance Manager to support the sports with their high performance needs and engage a G4G Coordinator to support the delivery of the programme, as well as hold workshops for NFs. Funding support for participation in international competitions continued to be the funding area where most funding was utilized for.


National Sports Federations of the 28 sports on the 2015 Pacific Games programme were requested to submit funding applications outlining their preparation activities in line with the various G4G funding categories. Twenty-six out of the twenty-eight sports utilized G4G funding in 2013.

## Women and Sport

Our Women and Sport Committee sent one of their members, Salome Rihatta, to take part in the regional conference held in Tonga in 2013. The Deputy Chairperson of the PNG Athletes Commission Karo Lelai, was selected by the US State Department to be one of twenty women from around the world to be a part of the espnW supported Global Sports Mentoring Program. The program is designed to provide international participants with unique opportunities across all aspects of sports to develop relevant



management and business skills, gain exposure to the U.S. sports business, media, and non-profit environments, and establish lasting relationships and a global network of leaders in the sports sector in the USA. Lelai spent a month in the States being mentored by the President of the WNBA, Laurel Richie and developed a concept paper for establishment of a nation-wide semi-professional league for women in PNG.

On the sporting front the female members of Team PNG competing at the Pacific Mini-Games won 56% of Team PNG's gold medals despite being less in numbers than their male counterparts and the two most successful athletes in Wallis & Futuna were both female.

### **PNG Athletes Commission**

In its second year of a four year term, the PNG Athletes Commission (PNGAC) had a busy year with several different activities. In addition to its core mandate of ensuring the views of the athletes were

represented through their presence on the various PNGOC committees, the Chair and Deputy's presence on the Executive Board, the Justification Committee, the Sport HIV Committee, the SP Sports Awards



Committee and the Women and Sport Committee. The PNGAC Chairperson also represented the Oceania region at the 2013 IOC Athletes Forum held in Singapore.

2013 saw the PNGAC organize its biannual Athletes Forum which was attended by over 250 athletes and included presentations from the Love Your Coast program as well as ONOC Athletes Commission Chairperson Barbara Kendall on the Voices of the Athletes program and the Excellence 4 Life program. Barbara then ran an Excellence 4 Life session with a select group of elite athletes. The PNGOC through the Athletes Commission has entered into a partnership with the Institute of Business Studies to run the IBS Athletes Excellence Program. Through this program elite athletes will be given the opportunity to gain scholarships to undertake either IBS diploma or certificate courses. Athlete development sessions based on the Excellence 4 Life program will also be offered to athletes.



The success of the PNG Love Your Coast program was recognized by the IOC at the 10<sup>th</sup> World Conference on Sport and Environment when PNGOC received the Continental Sport & Environment award for the Oceania region, which was accepted by PNGAC Chairperson Alex Davani and representatives from the program partner organisation Sustainable Coastlines. The PNG Love Your Coast program activities in 2013 included supporting the Aroma Coast Rugby 7s tournament with presentations to the village communities and organising of clean-up activities, training of

additional athletes and sportspeople on the program, presentations to schools and communities and the staging of a sports and clean-up fun day in Hanuabada.

### **Sports HIV Committee**

Work under the Sports HIV Committee slowed down in 2013 as a direct result of a cut in funding from the National AIDS Council. Regardless of funding the committee will still provide support to National Federations wishing to mainstream HIV and AIDS activities into their sports.



### **PNG Sports Anti-Doping Organisation**

With increased capacity, PNGSADO was able to carry-out both in competition and out of competition testing in 2013. At the request of the Oceania Regional Anti-Doping Organization, PNGSADO, conducted 8 in competition tests of athletes taking part in the FORU Rugby Union tournament held in PNG. Out of competition testing was also conducted on 5 PNG athletes preparing for the Wallis & Futuna Pacific Mini-Games and 5 additional athletes post mini-games.

### **International Conferences**

As part of our efforts to remain abreast of current developments affecting PNGOC's role and responsibilities, representatives from the PNGOC attended various international conferences and trips throughout the year.

### **PNGOC Delegation to IOC headquarters**

PNGOC Board members Richard Kassman, Emma Waiwai and Alex Davani visited the IOC Headquarters in Lausanne, Switzerland from 13th to 15th May. Each were first time visitors to the IOC offices and through their meetings with the IOC President; Olympic Solidarity and other departments of the IOC, they gained a greater appreciation and understanding of the work of the IOC and the role the PNGOC has in the Olympic movement. The trip was funded by the IOC.

### **ANOC Extraordinary General Assembly, Lausanne**

Funded by Association of National Olympic Committees (ANOC), the PNGOC President and Secretary General attended the ANOC Extraordinary General Assembly in Lausanne, Switzerland on the 15th of June. The annual event is an opportunity for all of the National Olympic Committees from around the world to gather and discuss and make recommendations on the important issues facing the IOC and the Olympic movement.

### **World Handball Federation Oceania Meeting**

Loretta Hasu, Sports Program Officer attended the meeting of the World Handball Federation in Guam from 27<sup>th</sup> to 28<sup>th</sup> September in an attempt to encourage NOCs to establish Handball Federations. The

meeting was facilitated by the ONOC – Guam office. The meeting has led to the establishment of the PNG Handball Federation which aims to establish the sport in PNG. Funding for the conference was covered by ONOC and the WHF.

### Oceania National Olympic Committees General Assembly

Funded by ONOC, the PNGOC President and Secretary General attended the 2013 Oceania National Olympic Committees (ONOC) General Assembly in Denarau, Fiji on 20 April. Prior to the General Assembly the Olympic Solidarity Regional Forum and Workshops were held from 17th to 19th April to bring ONOC members up to date with the 2013 - 2016 Olympic Solidarity Programmes.

### Commonwealth Games General Assembly

Funded by Commonwealth Games Federation, the President attended the General Assembly in Glasgow, Scotland on 16th August 2013.

### Fundraising Events

Our annual Prime Minister's Corporate Golf Challenge and Trukai Fun Run are dedicated to raising funds for Team PNG's participation at international events on the games calendar. The Prime Ministers presence and participation at both the Corporate Golf Challenge and Trukai Fun Run added to the significance and success of both events.

### PM's Golf

The Prime Minister's Golf Challenge for 2013 was held in Port Moresby on May 31<sup>st</sup> and in Lae on July 14<sup>th</sup>. 26 Teams participated in Lae while 52 competed in Port Moresby.

Papua New Guinea Prime Minister Peter O'Neill participated in the Port Moresby challenge.

### Trukai Fun Run

From the auctions in Lae and Port Moresby to the Fun Run itself, the 2013 Trukai Fun Run was fantastically supported. The auction in Lae on May 1<sup>st</sup> at the Lae Yacht Club and attended by bidders representing thirty one various organisations sold 22,440 shirts and raised a total of K226, 900.

The Trukai Fun Run shirt auction in Port Moresby on May 2<sup>nd</sup> set a new record of number of shirts sold, with a total of 56,300 shirts sold, raising K566,100 on the night. The National Gaming Control Board was a record bidder, purchasing 15,800 shirts.

People in Port Moresby, Lae, Goroka, Kavieng, Kokopo, Lihir, Popondetta, Mt. Hagen and Ok Tedi participated in the 2013 Trukai Fun Run on June 23<sup>rd</sup>. PNG Prime Minister, Peter O'Neill and the Minister for Sports, 2015 Pacific Games and National Events, Justin Tkatchenko also joined in the Trukai Fun Run.



### SP Sports Awards

Behind a Pacific theme of Going for Gold, the 2013 SP Sports Awards witnessed its 21<sup>st</sup> presentation night recognizing the achievements of members of the PNG sporting community. The guest speaker Nigel Vagana,



a former New Zealand Rugby League with Samoan heritage was warmly welcomed by the finalists and the crowd on the night with his message focused on athlete personal development.

Toea Wisil was named Female Athlete of the year for the second year running, opening batsman of the PNG National Cricket team Assad Vala was the Male Athlete of the Year and the PNG Palais, the women's national Rugby

## Queens Baton relay

Papua New Guinea was part of the Queen's Baton Relay in 2013 for the Glasgow Commonwealth Games in 2014. PNG was the 10th country in the route of the Baton and the first in the Pacific region. While in PNG the Queen's Baton visited Port Moresby and Kavieng. The Queen's Baton arrived for its four day visit in Port Moresby on November 4th and the relay saw the baton exchanged between sporting personalities and school children. It seemed the whole of the New Ireland province stopped to welcome the Queens Baton in Kavieng where it went through the hands of 150 people, including across an ocean passage by canoe. The relay was a special moment for all those involved.

Other activities were organised to coincide with the Queen's Baton Relay, such as the UNICEF partnered Schools Sports Program as the finale to the Relay in Port Moresby, a English Tea party for children in Kavieng hosted by the British High Commission and the Corporate Barefoot Bowls Day on Thursday, 7<sup>th</sup> of November.



## 2015 Pacific Games

The PNGOC in its capacity as the PNG Pacific Games Association continued to play a vital role in the build-up to the Port Moresby 2015 Pacific Games, with PNGOC board members on the various committees responsible for the delivery of the Games. Much of the development on the facilities needed for the Games has begun and the Organising Committee has been liaising with all stakeholders to ensure everything required is in place.

## TREASURER'S REPORT

### 1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Papua New Guinea Olympic Committee Inc. is an association domiciled in Papua New Guinea. The address of the associations' registered office is at Sir John Guise Stadium Port Moresby, National Capital District Papua New Guinea. The association's principal activity is a non-government organization that represents the interests of its members, the National Sports Federations.

The Papua New Guinea Olympic Committee Inc. includes the National Olympic Committee, The Commonwealth Games Association, The Pacific Games Association, and the Fund Raising Committee.

The financial statements were approved at the Executive Committee Members Meeting held on the 25 June 2014.

#### **Subsidiary**

The Papua New Guinea Olympic Committee Inc. owns 100% of the PNG 2015 Pacific Games Organising Committee, PNG 2015 Pacific Games Ltd. The investment in subsidiary is shown at cost.

#### **Basis of preparation**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Associations Act (Chapter 142). The financial statements are based on the historical cost and do not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated.

#### *(i) Special purpose financial statements*

This is a special purpose financial report for the sole purpose of providing financial information to the members and must not be used for any other purpose.

The association is an exempt organization in accordance with Section 171 of the Companies Act 1997 as the members have elected to be exempt under Section 171 (1b).

As the association is an exempt organization it has taken advantage of the exemption provided by the ASB from complying with:

- IAS 12 – Income Taxes
- IAS 27 - Consolidated Financial Statements and Accounting for Investments in Subsidiaries
- IAS 32 - Financial Instruments, Disclosures and Presentation

#### **(a) Presentation of financial statements**

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements, and have been applied consistently by the Association.

#### **(b) Foreign currency transactions**

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the exchange rate at the date of the transaction. Foreign currency monetary assets and liabilities are translated at the exchange rate at the balance date. Resulting exchange differences are recognised in the profit and loss account for the year. Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currency are recorded at the exchange rate at the date of the transaction.

## 1 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

### (c) Property, plant and equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are stated at original cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation is provided on cost amount of all fixed assets, including buildings so as to write off the assets progressively over their estimated useful lives. Fixed assets are first depreciated in the year of acquisition.

The straight line method of depreciation is used and the rates of depreciation used are :

Office equipment	30%
Motor vehicles	25%
Furniture and equipment	12.5%
Buildings	4%

### (d) Impairment

The carrying amounts of all assets are reviewed at each balance date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment.

### (e) Inventories

Sports wear and accessories purchased for past Olympic, Commonwealth and Pacific Games, but not yet used are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

### (f) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation as a result of a past event, and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation.

### (g) Taxation

The association is exempt from income tax under Section 27(b) of the PNG Income Tax Act as a sporting body.

### (h) Revenue

The major source of revenue for the association is grants and sponsorship income. Revenue is recognised when the funds are received.

### (i) Provisional Reserve

## 2013 Judo Activity Report



### INTRODUCTION

This activity report summary looks at both the achievements and hindrances from the administration as well as the competition point of view. We will discuss competitions and/or seminars attended by PNG participants and their results at the regional and/or international levels. These include competition and organisation of events, administration, membership, and fulfilling requirements of OJU, IJF, and PNGSFOC.

The report summary also looks at revising the key performance indicators for the year 2013 and planning for 2014.

### EXECUTIVE REPORT

An Executive & Committee Meeting and Selection Trials will be held on 28th December 2014 at Gereka Judo Club in Port Moresby. The way forward will be discussed, including the analysis of the Strategic Plan for 2012-2015 and 2014 RAT.

### DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS VISITS

- There were no official visits from officials and athletes outside of PNG in 2013.

### PARTICIPATION AT LOCAL AND INTERNATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

- January – although the items were sent in late 2012, PNGJF received Event Management Program laptop, 100 judo uniforms and 30 judo mats from the International Judo Federation. The judo mats and uniforms were diverted to NSI Goroka. NSI assisted cleared the uniform and equipment in February 2013.
- 14/02/12 – Launch of the ASOP Grassroots Judo Development Funding by the Australian High Commission. Tim Bryson, the First Secretary officially handed over the grant at the media conference at PNGSFOC office. All athletes executives attended.
- 09/03/13 – John Jambert & Norma Delai attended the PNGSF Talent Identification Programs and PNGSFOC Grassroots to Gold Program workshops at Ela Beach Hotel in Port Moresby.
- 10/04/13 – PNG was represented in the in the 2013 OJU Congress in Cairns, Australia by President John Jambert. Mr. Jambert was also elected as the 1st Vice President of OJU. Funding for the trip was by PNGSFOC Solidarity funding.
- 13-14/04/13 – PNG participated in the 2013 OJU Championships and Congress in Cairns, Australia. Mr Raymond Ovinou (-66kg M), Mr. Ashaan Nelson (-66kg M) competed. Mr. Ovinou finished with a Bronze medal. The team officials were Mr. John Jambert and Mr. Nolan Kom. Funding for the trip was by PNGSFOC Solidarity funding.
- 9-November 2013 – John Jambert attended the OJU Congress in Auckland. He was also elected the 1st Vice President of OJU. Mr. Raymond Ovinou was selected to attend the OJU Open Championships in Samoa but Air Niugini denied him boarding on 12 November 2013 and he did not make it.
- 22 November – Raymond Ovinou was selected as the Queens Baton Runner. PNGJF Volunteers assisted in the run.

### CLUBS PROGRESS REPORTS

The Gereka Judo Club outside Port Moresby continues with its training and is in full swing. The instructors are Raymond Ovinou and assisted by Ashaan Nelson.  
 The Port Moresby National High School Judo Club was started by Betty Oa, a staff member

and former judo athlete. The school administration has allowed the use of the Assembly Hall for training purposes and 20 judo mats from Gereka Judo Club were given to get the club going. However, towards the end of the year, the Principal was not happy with outsiders coming into the school for training. Assistance was sought from PNG Sports Foundation and a space formerly used for squash in the Sir John Guise Indoor complex was given and the mats at Pom Nats were brought over in December 2013.

Training will commence in 2014 for the revamped Pom Judo Club.

The Port Moresby International High School Judo Club remains shut after instructor Mapi Court and, a French teacher left for Mexico in 2012. The whereabouts of the judo mats there are being investigated to get across to Pom Judo Club.

The NSI Judo Club in Goroka started classes in December 2013. The program will continue in mid-January 2014.

Negotiations are also held with the Sports Development Officers from Asaro District Administration to start another club with electoral development funding from the Member for Daulo Open and the University of Goroka.

### SUCCESSFUL GRANTS APPLICATIONS

PNGSFOC allocated US\$10,000 for Olympic Solidarity in 2013. The fund was consolidated into the training programs for Raymond Ovinou and selected athletes leading up to participation at the 2016 Rio Olympics. Raymond was selected to travel to Samoa to compete at the 2013 OJU Championships and World Cup but could not make it due to Air Niugini denying him boarding. The funds were instead diverted to the Goroka NSI Judo Olympic Solidarity Program and Talent Identification Program.

### ACHIEVEMENTS

- Getting a formal Executive Board and Committee Members for the association going.
- Getting the Pom Judo Club and Goroka Judo Clubs going.

### ISSUES & CHALLENGES

- Judo was dropped from the list of optional sports for the 2015 Pacific Games in PNG by the Organising Committee. However, being an Olympic and Commonwealth Games sport, other avenues are being sought with partners to ensure judo programs are supported.
- Shortfalls in funding have always been an issue. All athletes are unemployed, and fund raising efforts have not been successful. There is too much reliance on PNGSFOC and outside donor agencies for much needed support to exposure and develop our junior development and elite athletes outside of PNG.
- Membership at club levels has slowly dropped. This was due to school-age children leaving for other educational institutions upon completion of school, inflexible training hours due to school and employment, and transportation and law and order issues relating to afternoon training sessions.
- Cost of training equipment and facilities in PNG is another obstacle. Judo is a specialized sport and ALL uniforms and mats are sourced from abroad. Those that are donated from outside are then held by IRC for duty purposes, thus causing further complications.
- Establish network with key stakeholders to establish judo development programs outside of Port Moresby and Goroka programs going.
- The need for a permanent development officer to get judo off from where it is now.
- Source permanent training venues, resources and negotiate partnership deals to further the interests of PNGJF.



## 2013 Karate Activity Report



### Introduction

Karate started 2013 well and completing its targeted programs throughout 2013 by topping it with a training camp, Strategic Plan Review and the Annual General Meeting in December 2013.

### Karate Clubs and Association

The traditional karate styles registered with PNG Karate-Do Federation (PNGKF) are; Goju Ryu, Kyokushin, and Shotokan. In 2013 Shito Ryu, and Shorin Ryu joined PNGKF.

This paved the way for the association of the following thirty (30) karate clubs; Adzera Markham Shotokan Karate, Bereina TKU Shotokan Karate, Bogia Shotokan Karate, Boram Shotokan Karate, Bulolo Shotokan Karate, Buka Shotokan Karate, Ela Murray Shotokan Karate, Goroka International Shotokan Karate, Goroka Shotokan Karate, Hoskins Shotokan Budokai Karate, Kimbe Grammar School, Kokopo Shotokan Karate, Kwikila Shotokan Karate, Lahi Shotokan Karate, Lae Shito Ryu, Madang International Shotokan Karate, Madang Shotokan Karate, Manus Shotokan Karate, Papa Shotokan Karate, Popondetta Shotokan Karate, PNG Mas Oyama Kyokushin Karate Association, RAM Shotokan Karate, Rock Shotokan Budokai Karate, Space Shotokan Karate, Tanga Kyokushin Karate, Taurama Shorin Ryu, Tavor Shotokan Karate (Kimbe), UNITECH Goju Ryu, Wau Shotokan Karate, and Wewak Shotokan Karate.

As part of karate's expansion into schools, karate clubs were opened at Ela Murray International School, Goroka International School, and Madang International School.

### Junior Development

The tournaments of the year included the development program for 6 years to 17 year olds. Junior events are normally held together with seniors' tournament; hence the various junior divisions held in the tournaments were;

- Children (6 Years – 7 Years) – PNGKF sanctioned category
- Children (8 Years – 9 Years) – PNGKF sanctioned category
- Children (10 Years – 11 Years) – Oceania sanctioned category
- Children (12 Years – 13 Years) – Oceania sanctioned category
- Cadet Division (14 Years – 15 Years) – WKF & Oceania sanctioned category
- Junior Division (16 Years – 17 Years) – WKF & Oceania sanctioned category

There were no specific seminars or training camps for children and juniors' categories in the year, except for athletes who are in the Cadet Division and Junior Division who are part of the National Development Squad (NDS).

### National Development Training Camps and Elite Training Camps

The planned development training camps for the year were all held expect for the delay of the July Training Camp due to delayed funding caused by the funding fiasco between PNG Sports Foundation, PNG Olympics Committee and National Department of Finance. The training camps were;

- 1<sup>st</sup> -5<sup>th</sup> April 2013, Port Moresby Country Club, NCD
- 8<sup>th</sup> -19<sup>th</sup> July 2013, Gordon's International School, Port Moresby
- 1<sup>st</sup> – 5<sup>th</sup> & 9 – 13<sup>th</sup> December, Port Moresby (held in 3 venues; Ela Murray, PomNats & Don Bosco Technological Institute).

There was only one Elite Training Camp during the year was at Shotokan Karate Budokai Honbu, Brisbane on 25<sup>th</sup> – 26<sup>th</sup> March 2013

### Domestic Tournaments

There were two national tournaments held in the year as follows;

- 7<sup>th</sup> PNG Open Karate Titles, Ela Murray International School, Port Moresby
- 24<sup>th</sup> National Karate Championships, Sir John Guise Stadium, Port Moresby

**Hosted International Tournaments**

The inaugural Australasian Karate Festival was held at Don Bosco Technological Institute, Port Moresby on 6-7<sup>th</sup> December 2013 as a test event. A total of 160 athletes took part with two teams from Fiji.

**2015 Development Squad Selection**

PNGKF had a total of 109 athletes in the development squad which have been building since 2011. Thus, the Australasian Karate Festival competition was also used to give the athletes the opportunity to hone their skills.

**Referees Seminar and Examinations**

In all the major events that were held referees seminar were held concurrently as ongoing training for the referees prior to the events.

Overall rating on the performance of PNG Netball for the reporting period was 3.5 out of 5.

### Membership

Unfortunately, PNG Netball was not able to secure membership from the Highlands region.

#### Talent Identification & Development

In this reporting period, PNG Netball's talent identification and development program was focused on its high performance program particularly with its U21 development and national team. As a result of this, a total of 5 members of the WYC team comprise of the Open National team.

### GAME DEVELOPMENT

PNG Netball's Game Development Program has been promoted and implemented under the auspices of the Pacific Netball Partnership program. In this reporting period, PNG Netball has launched its Umpiring Accreditation Framework, its Bench Official Accreditation Framework and its Coaching Accreditation Framework. This respective framework will set the pace for the implementation of the organisation's technical development programs throughout its membership nationwide.

In the reporting period, the following has been undertaken thus far:-

#### Bench Official Program

A 4-day Bench Official Training Program was undertaken in August by Ms Belinda Clark of Netball New Zealand.

#### Umpires Program

A 4 day Umpires training program was undertaken in August by Ms Pamela Clayton of Netball New Zealand.

### Coaching Program

Whilst the PNG Coaching Accreditation Framework is yet to be launched, a number of coaching training programs have been undertaken by the 2 national coaches (Mrs Annie Iamo & Mrs Margaret Opina) in New Zealand.

On the domestic front, a number of coaching clinics have been conducted in a number of locations through sponsorship by Digicel PNG Ltd. Coaching clinics were conducted in Kokopo, Alotau, Lae, Kwikila and NCD. A total of 15 coaches participated on this program.

### DOMESTIC EVENTS

#### **Digicel National Championships**

The 2013 Digicel National Championships was held in Port Moresby, NCD from 23 – 29 September which saw a total of 15 associations participate and over 2,500 athletes attend the week-long event.

The 2013 championships registered one of the largest number of participants in the history of the tournament. This was attributed mainly to increased membership and interest by the netballing community throughout the country.

From this championship a total of 67 players have been selected to be part of the train-on squad for the 2015 Pacific Games. The 2014 national titles will be held in Kimbe, West New Britain province.

### ADMINISTRATION, GOVERNANCE & FINANCE

#### **Governance**

##### **Oceania Netball Federation Annual General Meeting**

PNG Netball attended the ONF's AGM in June 2013 in Apia which coincided with the Pacific Netball Series.

##### **International Netball Federation Congress**

In August 2013, PNG Netball attended the INF Congress in Glasgow, Scotland which coincided with the World Youth Championships.

##### **Governance Review Workshop**

Following a number of workshops held in 2012, at least 2 workshops were held in the reporting period mainly focusing on the reviewing of the constitution and policies for PNG Netball.

##### **Incorporation of PNG Netball Federation Inc.**

In May 2013, PNG Netball Federation Inc was incorporated under the Associations Act through the Companies Office.

#### **Administration**

In 2013, PNG Netball recruited its Netball Development Officer who commenced work in April 2013.

## 2013 Squash Activity Report

### PNG SQUASH RACQUETS FEDERATION

The Federation in 2013 has been focused on the preparation of the team towards the 2015 Pacific Games. A number of activities were embarked on this year to develop a team for the 2015 Pacific Games. These centred around skills development, high performance training methods and exposure to high level competition during the year. We also embarked on the development of our elite athletes in Penang at the Penang Squash Academy in 2013. Two Athletes have been earmarked for the development as they are the two most likely athletes to produce gold at the 2015 Pacific Games in both the mens and ladies events.

The lack of courts in Port Moresby has meant that there was a lack of activity locally with Squash. A number of meetings have been held with the VIEC committee in fast tracking this, however at year's end we are still no where near to getting any facilities. The lack of facilities has been a key factor in the stifling of preparation of the team's efforts for 2015 Pacific Games. We are currently utilising the Life Gym and the John Guise indoor stadium courts towards end of the year to prepare the team. This is again at the mercy of club memberships where there is limited use of the facility. No competitions can be run at these facilities as they are limited to members only. Thus, the sooner the facilities are built it would also bring back the much needed competitions and participation needed back to the squash scene.

2013 saw the resurrection of the Lae Squash Association after being defunct for several years. Lae Association is expected to be financial in the new year 2014. Lae also ran a successful Lae Open Championship this year. This should strengthen the squash scene in the country.

The Ambassadors program is also planned for June of 2014 where one top female and male squash player will visit PNG to promote squash. It would be hoped that this would raise the profile of squash, enthuse the local squash community, perhaps kick-start some programmes etc. This could be a precursor to the 2015 Pacific Games Squash Programme.

This coupled with the coaching education program through the commonwealth games secretariat will help achieve certification of Papua New Guinean coaches at two different levels. These being the beginner and advanced coaching levels. It is hoped that the beginner level coaching will increase the participation rates of juniors in squash.

Other activities during the year, commenced with the selection of the train on team for the 2015 Pacific Games. A team of twelve players has been nominated for the 2015 Games. This will be cut down in 2014 to focus on a target team of ten players for the Games.

Under the elite athletes program two of our medal potentials were training at the Nicol David Academy. The initial assessment indicated that two different streams of development needed to be applied to both athletes as both were at different stages of development. With the Elite male athlete it was recommended, tournament exposure was what was needed to improve performance. Thus a series of tournament is being organised for 2014 in the Malaysian circuit. With the female athlete, it was recommended that, further development at the academy would be more appropriate.

A junior squash coaching program was also started towards the end of the year in Port Moresby, with some promising signs of talented juniors to emerge. Depending on availability of the Sir Guise courts, a junior squash competition will be run in early 2014.

A number of competitions were attended by the train on team in 2013 in preparation for 2015 Games; these being the Victorian Open, Victorian Juniors, Ballarat Open, Lae Open and the Singapore Juniors. Their performance at these events provided a baseline for Squash Management to see where athletes are at present and what more needs to be done to develop them to achieve targeted performance outcomes. Participants who attended the Ballarat Open, Victorian Open and the Victorian Junior Events were, Junior Madako, Schubert

Maketu, Daryl Sirigoi, Joey Kala, Dorothy Boyce, Shiela Morove, Dottie Suari, Olding Suari and Lynette Vai.

At the Ballarat Open, Lynette Vai lost in the final of that event to Melody Francis who is ranked around 54 in the women world squash circuit. The men lost at round one of the Ballarat Open.

Lynette Vai also won the Victorian Open juniors event in the under 17 event in Melbourne. Dottie Suari was runner up at this event. At the Victorian Open Dorothy Boyce and Lynette Vai finished second and third, respectively, in the mixed division event in Division 4. The men's team fared fairly well in that they competed in Divisions One and Two which were the premier divisions outside of the professional circuit. It is to be noted that our main competition at the Pacific Games, namely New Caledonia, competed in that Division as well.

As part of the elite development Lynette Vai also competed in the Singapore Open event in the juniors under 17 where she won 5 out of the six matches she played under a monrad draw, losing only to the winner of the tournament.

The current crop of players are a younger group as opposed to previous teams, however provided the proper exposure is provided we expect this team to be a dominating force in the region for quite some time.

### Objectives & Major Achievements for the year:

Papua New Guinea Swimming Inc throughout 2013 continued to promote the sport of swimming through education and competitions and good governance. As in past years the executive looked for opportunities to best carry the sport forward into the future alongside the concept of “better sports for kids and better kids for life”.

PNGSI had the unwavering support of all its executive members working together in a positive and committed manner to best serve the athletes, coaches and officials in PNG and those living and training overseas.

The 2013 Council Meeting and the Annual General Meeting of Papua New Guinea Swimming Inc was held on Saturday March 30 which saw President Elizabeth Wells MBE, Vice President Bruce Mead, Registrar Barbara Skelton, Treasurer Sarenah Pini, Secretary Carly Pini, Property Officer Lois Nakmai, Chief Technical Officer Kathleen Maskelyne, Public Relations Margaret Gore and Honorary Auditor Darius Kombe of Darkom Accounting and Business Consultants elected.

In 2013 Papua New Guinea Swimming Inc was affiliated to FINA, Oceania Swimming Association and PNG Olympic Committee which is carried on into 2014.

The affiliated Clubs of Lae and Boroko played an important part in the area of development, working alongside PNGSI to provide a more professional team of technical officials and coaches to run sanctioned Club carnivals and competitions at the FINA level, and coach our swimmers in all age groups to compete on the national and international level.

The support and encouragement our athletes received from their swimming teachers and coaches in the Clubs, both in-country and overseas, played a very significant part in PNGSI being able to identify a strong group of swimmers to represent us at national and international events in 2013.

Competitions held throughout the year have developed leadership, pride and team spirit in our athletes encouraging them to become the best they can be.

National events included:

- Theodist National Championships (May 3-5).
- NGCB Dolphin Sprints (July 5-6).
- TNT National Short Course Championships (September 27-29).

Major International competitions PNG swimmers participated in were:

- 15<sup>th</sup> FINA WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS held in Barcelona, Spain at the Palau Sant Jordi pool from 19<sup>th</sup> July to 4<sup>th</sup> August, 2013.
- 4<sup>th</sup> FINA WORL JUNIKOR SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIPS from August 26 – 31, 2013 was held in Dubai, UAE at the Hamdan Bin Mohammed Bin Rashid Sports Complex built in 2010.
- PNG affiliated swimmers based off shore were able to take part in the Australian States and Brisbane competitions, some of which had qualifying times to be able to compete in.

At the close of the year in competition we had a record number of swimmers being awarded a position on the PNGSI Junior and Intermediate Silver and Gold Aquatic Excellence Squads and Elite Kundu Target Silver and Gold Aquatic Excellence Squad. These squads continue to provide an incentive and motivation for our swimmers to do well and achieve.

PNG Records were challenged and broken throughout 2013 in all major competitions. In 2012 Sixty-nine (69) PNG Long Course and short course records were taken by our swimmers competing both in PNG and abroad while in 2013 Eighty-eight (88) new records were set in the Age, Open or Masters Categories. The oldest being previously set in 1987 in the female 17 year age group, a great achievement by our aspiring athletes in 2013.

*SWIMMING REPORT*

Areas of education both in country and overseas explored in 2013 were:

- The 2013 edition of the FINA SWIMMING OFFICIALS SCHOOL was successfully hosted by PNG Swimming Inc. at the Gateway Hotel in Port Moresby on the 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> April.
- ASCTA COACHES CONVENTION held from Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> May to Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> May at the Sofitel, Broadbeach on the Gold Coast saw Papua New Guinea Swimming Inc. send 7 active pool deck coaches, Sue Babao, Doris Mileng, Villiwa Puana, Joe Meaurio, Albert Vigil, and Ryan Pini.
- The DREAM Program initiated by Gangwon Province saw PNG Swim Coach Villiwa Puana Voi and female swimmer 14-year old Jasmine Mileng of Boroko Swim Club take part in the 2013 Dream Program hosted by the Pyeong Chang 2018 Olympic Winter Games organisers, held in Gangwon Province, Republic of Korea from the 5<sup>th</sup> to 17<sup>th</sup> January.
- Two week swim training camp - Two onshore based male swimmers from the Lae Amateur Swimming Club 16 year old Benedict Livingston Aika and 17 year old Collin Akara flew out to Brisbane on the 2nd of December to attend a two week training camp with the Yeronga Park Swimming Club, in Queensland.

It is PNGSI's vision to have a well prepared team to represent us each year, excited, pumped and well prepared to bring our dream and the swimmers, coaches and officials dreams to realisation. Together with G4G funding and BSP sponsorship and our tireless band of volunteers, we have continued to provide the support to strengthen our communities through youth development, healthy living and social responsibility, establishing a positive, productive direction for the code of swimming to travel on.

PNGSI strongly believes that every person should be given the opportunity to participate in our swimming program, regardless of their ability or age. We talk about values: When a child is taught a sport, he or she not only learns how to play the game and the techniques that bring success, but a child is also taught how to play fair, be a good sport and a great team player. ### MEMBERSHIP

2013 saw the expansion of affiliated Clubs from six in 2011 to 26.

### COMPETITIONS

#### Domestic

The only two local competition run under Taekwondo PNG. They were;

- 1<sup>st</sup> Korean Ambassadors Tkd Cup Championships, and
- PNG National championships in Port Moresby held in April and December respectively.

#### International

PNG's top athletes were sent to two international events namely;

- the Aus vs PNG match day in Canberra, Australia as lead up to the Mini Pacific Games, and
- the 2013 Pacific Mini Games where the team captured the hearts and medals of the Wallis Games bringing home 1 Gold, 10+ Silver and 6+ Bronze.

### TRAINING CAMPS

#### Domestic

A total of three camps were held on-shore. This included the

- 1<sup>st</sup> National camp in April run by Edward Kassman.
- A second camp was then held in September just before departure to the 2013 Pacific Mini Games and was run jointly by Edward Kassman and assistant Coach Thomas Tawan.
- The final camp for the year was held in December leading up to the PNG National championships. Former World champion (now International Coach) Hyung Jin Park was invited through Lee's Taekwondo Australia under the leadership of High Performance Manager Stuart Lee.

#### International

PNG's National team under the support of the Go for Gold program attended its first and only High Performance International camp for the year as lead up to the 2013 Pacific Mini Games.



### DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

TPNG did not run Development programs nationwide due to the lack of funds bearing in mind that Go for Gold funds only supports Programs specific to 2015.

### WORKSHOPS

Member Athletes on the PNG National attended Team PNG's bonding session at the Port Moresby International High School hall. With the majority of members on this team new to Pacific Games, this session was very helpful in our Athletes and officials get to know other Athletes and officials of the various sporting codes.

The second workshop attended was the PNG Athletes Forum in October. This was run by the PNG Athletes Commission and helped disseminate and share information among Athletes on various topics.

### ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Federation's AGM was held on the 16<sup>th</sup> December 2013 at the Caritas Secondary School, Pt Moresby. The meeting was attended by twenty two (22) Clubs from around the country..

### EQUIPMENT & TRAINING FACILITIES

Moresby. As part of the Team to Canberra for lead up to the Pacific Mini Games, TPNG Head Referee Cratsee Tito and female trainee referee Onne Avira attended their first International Referee course under the guidance of International Referee, Denzil Ray.

PNG's Referee's concluded the year with a two day Referee refresher course in December in preparation for the National championships. International Referee and mentor Mr Denzil Ray commended our Referee's and upgraded three Head referee's namely Margaret Augerea Karo, Watson Kore and Cratsee Tito.

PNG now has twenty + male and ten female Referee's accredited under the Oceania Taekwondo Union.

## **OTHER ACHIEVEMENTS**

### **1<sup>st</sup> PNG Taekwondo Open**

In early December Taekwondo PNG through its Sport Development Officer Edward Kassman wrote to the World Taekwondo Federation and secured PNG's first International Open Tournament. The event has been given a G1 ranking status and will see countries from around the world attend to beef up their Athletes world ranking points. With more ranking points, athletes around the world in the top 25 automatically qualify for the World Taekwondo Grand Prix and a possible entry into the 2016 Rio Olympic Games.

### **Oceania Taekwondo Championships**

Due to the lack of response from initial host (Samoa) for the 2014 Oceania Taekwondo championships, the Oceania Taekwondo Union has approached PNG to host this prestigious event. PNG will be expecting over two hundred international athletes and officials for the two day event here in Pt Moresby. Hosted events at the championships will consist of Junior and senior divisions in Sparring and Patterns competition. This will be the first time PNG will compete in Patterns (forms) through the assistance of Korean experts currently in country.

## 2013 Volleyball Activity Report



### GAME CHARACTERISTICS

#### *Indoor and Beach Volleyball*

Volleyball is a team sport that has two disciplines – *Indoor and Beach Volleyball* and is played under separate rules. The Indoor Volleyball has 12 players and Beach Volleyball has two players.

Indoor Volleyball is a sport played by two teams of six players on a playing court divided by a net while Beach Volleyball is played by two teams of two players each on a sand court divided by a net. There are different versions available for specific circumstances in order to offer the versatility of the two disciplines of the game to everyone.

The object of the game is to send the ball over the net in order to ground it on the opponent's court and prevent the same effort by the opponents. The rally continues until the ball is grounded on the playing court, goes "out" or a team fails to return it properly.

Volleyball is one of the most successful and popular competitive and recreational sports in the world. It is fast, it is exciting and the action is explosive.

### Launching of Amoa PNG

The brand naming of the national volleyball team was launched on the 14 August, 2013 at Sir John Guise Stadium. "Amoa" in local Hula and Toaripi languages mean "Eagle".

### Affiliated Members and 2013 PNG National Youth & Open Volleyball Championships

Only 12 local Associations paid their affiliation fee's on time which qualified them to participate at 2013 PNG National Youth and Open Volleyball Championship held in Port Moresby at Institute of Public Administration sports grounds from 25th – 28th October, 2013.

The Associations that took part in the 2013 PNG National Volleyball Championship were Vabukori, NCD, Fairfax, Tatana, Taikone, Mahuru, Ebco, Porebada, Huon Gulf, Alotau, Hula and Kiunga.

Vabukori Open Men's Team again won the 2013 PNG Open Men's Volleyball title for the 10<sup>th</sup> consecutive year in a row by beating strong Lae outfit from Huon Gulf Association, Morobe Province and Volleyball Fairfax made it back-to-back by retaining the 2013 Open Women's title.



## **VOLLEYBALL REPORT**

In the Youth Division, Vabukori Under 21 jump street boys wrestled the tile off from defending champions Hula surf riders in the men's division and NCD Under 21 city girls fought off a strong challenge from equally determined Volleyball Fairfax bay watch girls to retain the PNG National Junior Title in the women's division.

### **Junior Development and High Performance training overseas**

After the successful staging of the last two years PNG National Youth Championship in Port Moresby, the Executives will launch a medium term Junior Development Plan focusing on off-season and school competitions in Under 17 and Under 23 age groups for talent identification and preparation for the international tournaments in respective age categories in 2014.

The national team competed with several top class club teams at Gold Coast, Australia as part of their High Performance preparations for the mini games organized by Mr Aaron Alsop before leaving for the 9<sup>th</sup> Mini Pacific Games at Wallis and Futuna in September, 2013. The men's team made history by beating Pacific Games dual Gold Medalist, Wallis & Futuna on their own soil at the mini games.

### **Achievements**

2013 has been a exciting year for volleyball as it bagged its first – ever Gold Medal in volleyball history by PNG Amoa Men's team at Wallis & Futuna 9<sup>th</sup> Mini Pacific Games in September.

PNGOC approval resulted in the engagement of five Technical Officials by PNGVF to assist officiate matches at WF Mini Pacific Games both in Indoor and Beach competitions. This assisted officials to gain practical experiences and much needed international exposure at this level of competition.

The PNGVF successful bid at the last Oceania Games in New Caledonia now allows PNG to host the first ever Oceania Zonal Volleyball Champions in 2014.

The PNGVF Executives in consultation with PNGOC successfully secured the services of Mr Tomas Santamaria, an international FIVB instructor who conducted a one week Volleyball Referee's Refresher Course from 21 – 28 October, 2013. A total of 64 Technical Official participated – 58 men and 6 females.

Preparations are well underway to revitalize Referee's and Coach's Commission to improve standards of local competitions and increase basic skills levels of players in respective local associations throughout the country.

### **Way Forward**

Whilst measurable progress have been made in 2013, both the successes and obstacles experienced this year will be used as stepping stone to elevate volleyball, not only as a potential gold medal winning sport at Pacific Games but also as a number one recreational community development sporting activity throughout Papua New Guinea in the coming years.

Concerted efforts will continually be made by the current members of the Executive to further increase the standard of local competitions and improve skill levels of elite players in preparation for the June 2014 Oceania Championship to be held in PNG.

Amoa PNG has just wounded a lion of volleyball in the Pacific at the Mini Pacific Games and strategic preparations have been designed to fine tune our national men's team to face the resurrected opponent who is determined and more prepared now to spoil our party on our own soil at the Oceania Championship in 2014 and the Pacific Games in 2015.




