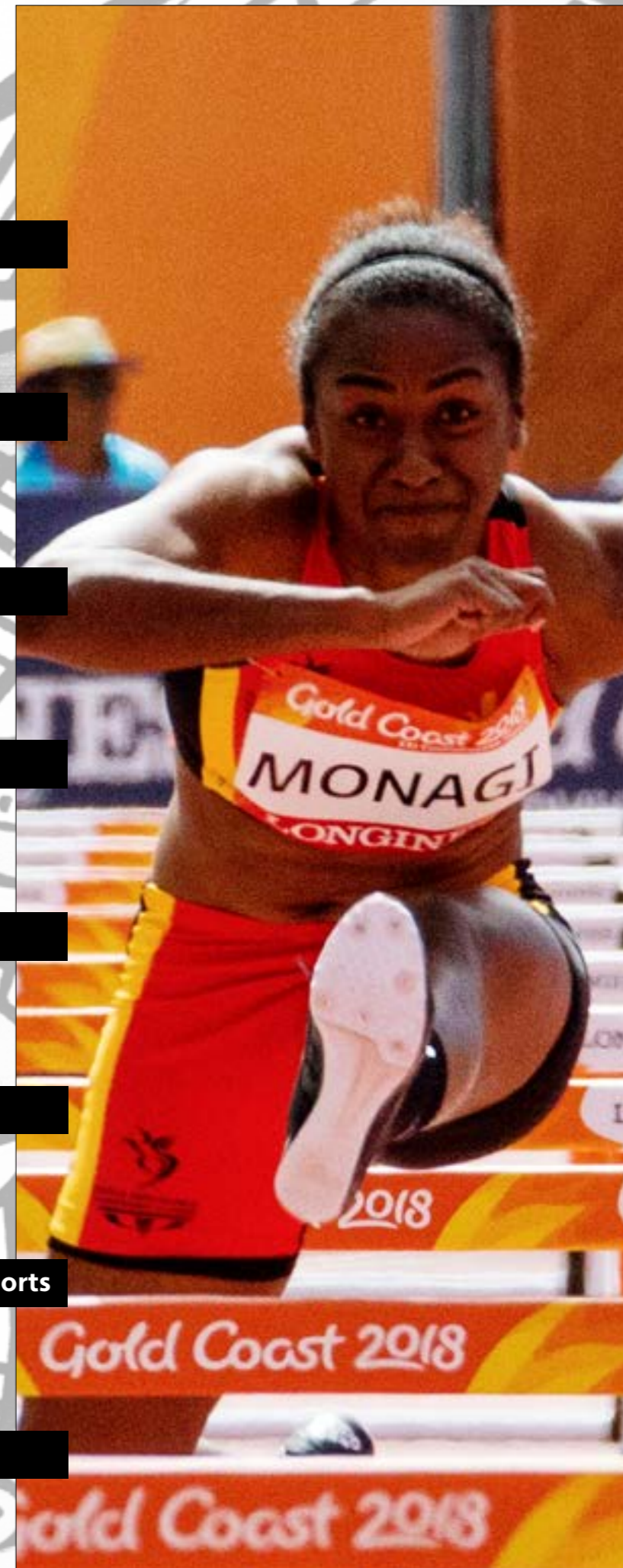

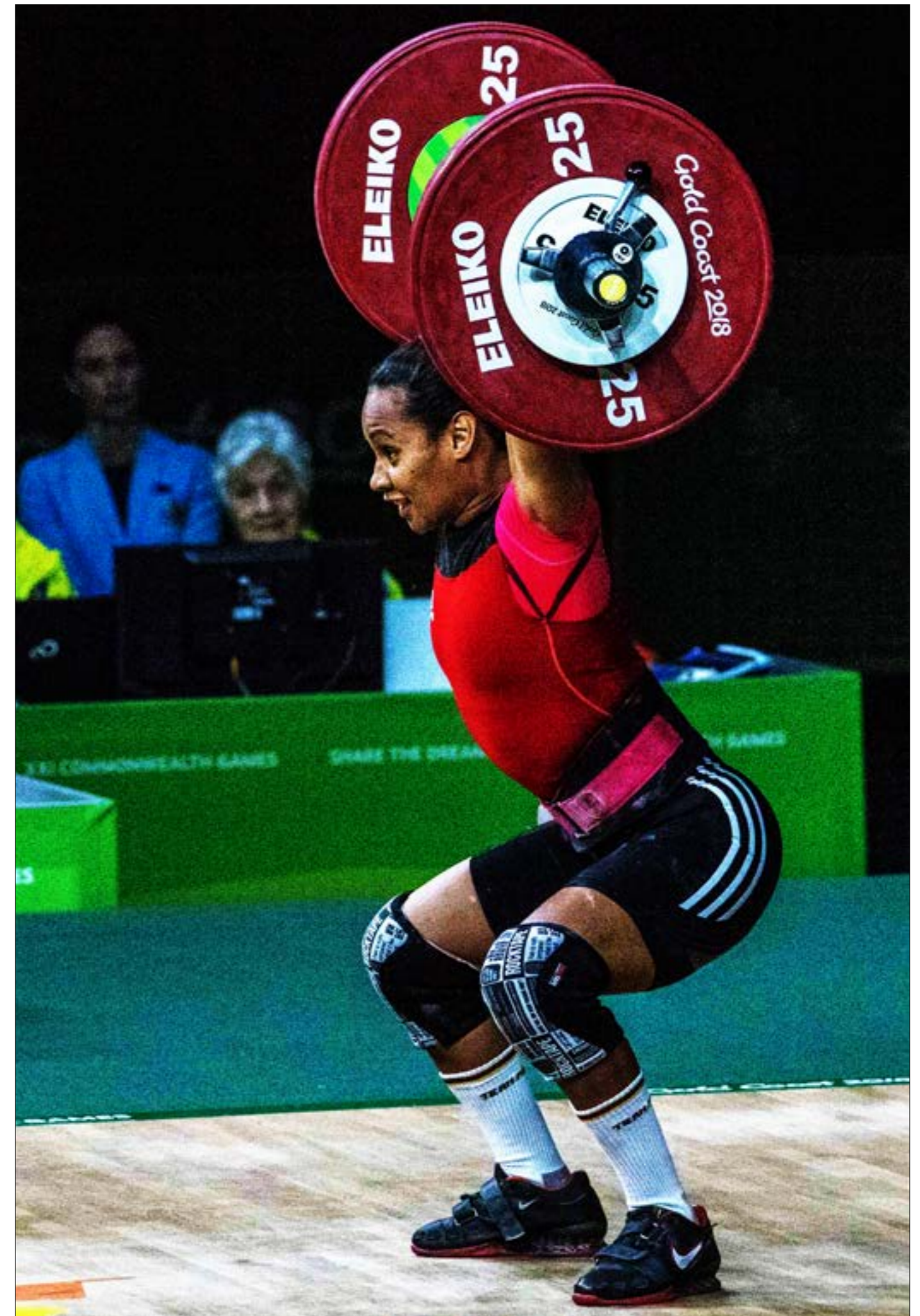

The year began with a very successful campaign at the Gold Coast Commonwealth Games which produced Team PNG's best ever medal performance at the Commonwealth Games.

To this end, we congratulate our dynamic trio of Steven Kari, Dika Toua and Morea Baru for their respective achievements of gold and silver medals in the sport of weightlifting.

They were ably supported by the International Olympic Committee scholarships (Dika and Morea), PNG Olympic Committee Executive Board and Management, Trukai Industries Limited, PNG Weightlifting Federation and Paul and Lilly Coffa of the Oceania Weightlifting Federation and their high performance institute in Noumea.

I am proud to say that the above results placed Team PNG 22 out of 71 nations who participated.

The performances brought iconic moments, new records, personal bests, great emotions which captivated the hearts and minds of the nation.

I also wish to commend athletes and officials in their respective sports as highlighted in the Secretary General's report under KRA 2: Team PNG Games Success (with mention of their performances).

They should be proud of the fact that they represented Papua New Guinea at the Commonwealth Games and that their athletes did their best and were part of the overall success of Team PNG.

It would be remiss of me not to mention Chef de Mission, Tamzin Wardley and her management team for their tireless efforts to ensure that all of our athletes' welfare was a priority.

This also reminded me of a quote from one of my mentors, Julius

Secretary General's REPORT

2018 was a year of highs and lows for the Papua New Guinea Olympic Committee. The following report describes our activities in 2018 based on the five Key Result Areas of our 2016-2020 Strategic Plan.



2018 was a significant year for the PNG Olympic Committee for a number of reasons including unprecedented success at the Commonwealth Games level and the realization of a long-held dream to own a property that will become the PNG Olympic Haus.

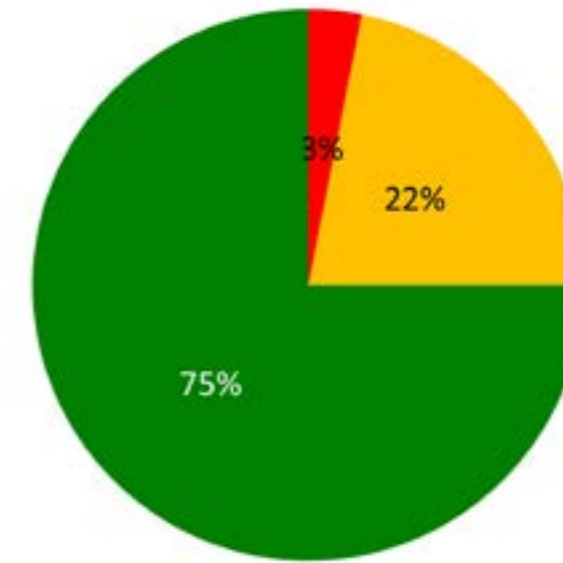
2018 also marked the mid-term of our 2016 – 2020 Strategic term. It provided an opportunity to reflect on the first two years and take stock of our Strategic Plan and see how we were tracking.

I am pleased to report that by the close of 2018 we achieved 62% of targets set out in our strategic plan.

The following report describes our activities in 2018 based on the five Key Result Areas of our 2016-2020 Strategic Plan.

KRA I: BEST PERFORMING PACIFIC NOC

KEY RESULT AREA 1: Best Performing Pacific National Olympic Committee - The PNGOC is recognised as the best performing NOC in the Pacific with a focus on management, governance, sustainability, brand awareness, gender equality, learning development, knowledge capture, anti-doping and recognition.

To be the Best Performing NOC, we continued to focus on strengthening our governance and operations while ensuring prudent financial management. A new Human Resource Policy was adopted with policies and procedures essential to the organization and to the productivity of our core business.

An effective secretariat is the cornerstone of interaction with stakeholders and delivery of our services for them.

2018 saw PNGOC take ownership of

our new permanent headquarters, a realisation of our long-time vision for the organisation. Purchasing the property that we are proud to call our 'home' and which will become our Olympic Haus is a big step towards improving our service.

Increasing revenue to achieve our priorities is a constant priority and 2018 saw progress in this area with an increased number of partners through our commercial program. Attending international engagements and giving Team PNG athletes the opportunity to

represent their country would not have been possible without the support of partners and sponsors. Trukai Industries Limited, Kumul Petroleum Holdings Limited, Exxon Mobil, Coral Seas Hotels, Air Niugini, SP Brewery, Capital Insurance, The National, Theodist, Media Partners, Blue 7 Team and Trophy Haus are all thanked for their support to the PNGOC and Team PNG.

Support also came in magnitude at our events, beginning with the Trukai Fun Run on June 24. Over 50,000

people attended the Fun Run in Port Moresby alone with additional numbers in 20 other centres nationwide. The support began through the various organisations who purchased fun run shirts through the auction event and through the many individuals who later purchased shirts through the public sales.

PNGOC's second largest fundraising event, the Prime Minister's Corporate Golf Challenge also drew much support from the corporate

sector with 51 teams participating in the September 21 event in Port Moresby. Competing teams took to the greens looking like champions thanks to event major sponsor of the golf challenge, The National Newspaper.

Following a highly successful sporting year for PNG sports in 2017, the SP Sports Awards was a tightly contested affair with all finalists staking their claim.

Legendary Australian Olympic ski-jumping medallist and World

Champion, Jacqui Cooper was the guest speaker and her story of determination and strength was inspiring for everyone present at the ceremony.

Dika Toua was awarded as the 2018 Female Athlete of the Year at the SP Sports Awards based on her achievements from 2017. Ase Boas from rugby league took out the Male Athlete of the Year award also based on his achievements from the previous year.

In all seven Team PNG members were

recognised for their efforts in 2017 at the 2018 SP Sports Awards.

Three former champion athletes who represented the nation in its early years were recognized for their achievements and contribution at the fourth edition of the PNG Sports Hall of Fame induction ceremony held in November.

It was a memorable night as sports all-rounder Kea Kapulu Schwarz, boxer Kenneth Hopkins and swimmer Charles Martin were inducted into

the PNG Sports Hall of Fame.

The audience was captivated as each shared their personal stories of triumph and memories from their sporting careers.

Schwarz and Hopkins were members of the PNG team to the first Pacific Games in Suva in 1963 while Martin was PNG's outstanding swimmer in the late 1960s to 1970s.

Hopkins won Team PNG's first ever medal at an international sporting

event when he won bronze at the 1962 British Empire Games (now the Commonwealth Games) in Perth, Australia. Both Schwarz and Martin were winners of the Sportsman of the Year award for the Territory of Papua and New Guinea in their days.

Hopkins, Martin and Schwarz became the twelfth, thirteenth, and fourteenth inductees into the PNG Sports Hall of Fame.

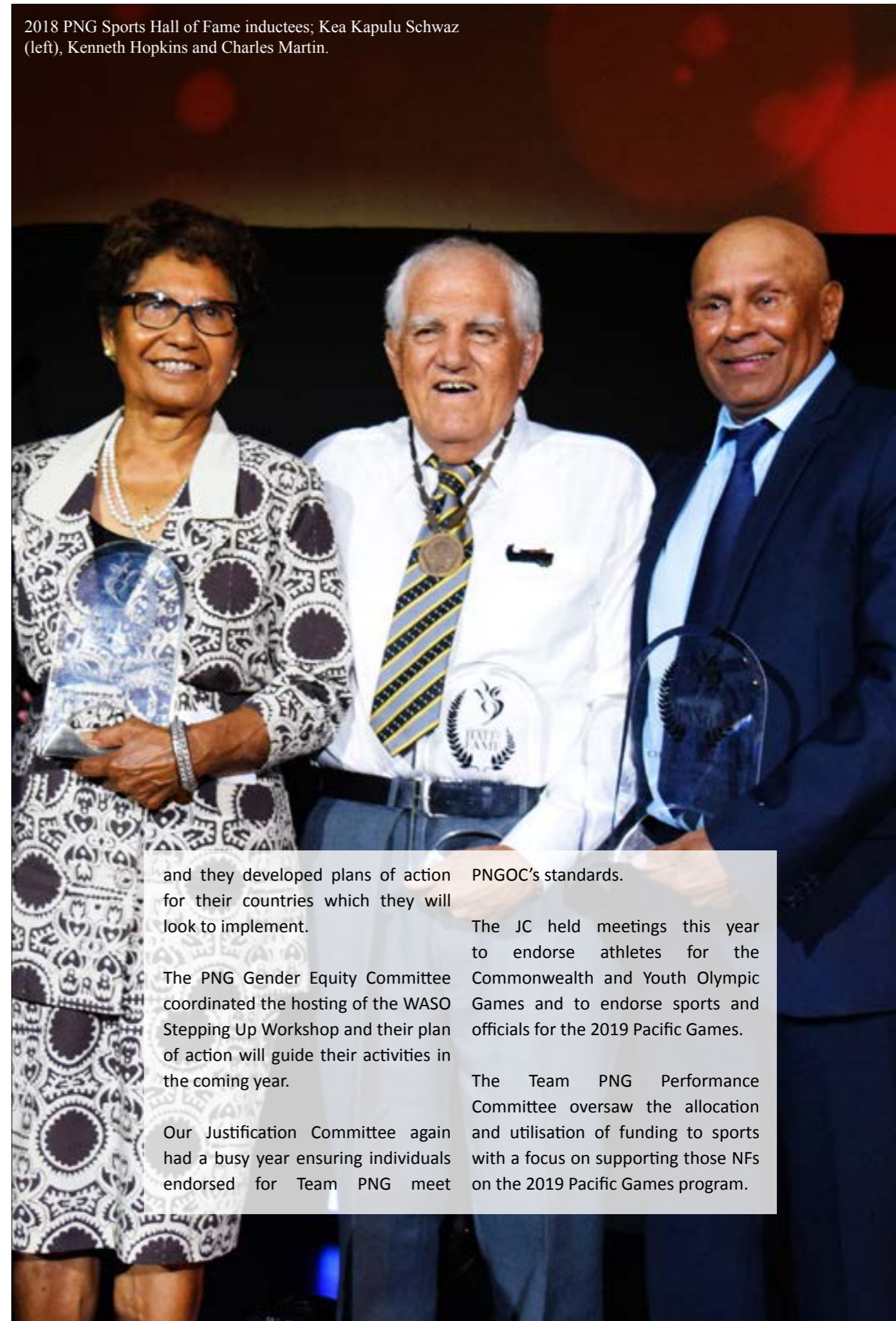
We were very happy to have had the opportunity to host an ONOC Athletes Commission meeting and the Women and Sport Oceania (WASO) Gender and Leadership

Melanesian workshop in Port Moresby.

The WASO workshop saw female and male participants from Solomon Islands, Vanuatu, Fiji, Tuvalu, Kiribati and PNG joined by WASO Commission members.

Under the theme “Stepping Up” the program was designed to empower those involved with women in sports initiatives to achieve greater impact their communities and covered important topics on understanding gender equality and equity, diversity and inclusion. Participants were able to share their experiences and ideas,

and they developed plans of action for their countries which they will look to implement.

The PNG Gender Equity Committee coordinated the hosting of the WASO Stepping Up Workshop and their plan of action will guide their activities in the coming year.

Our Justification Committee again had a busy year ensuring individuals endorsed for Team PNG meet

PNGOC’s standards.

The JC held meetings this year to endorse athletes for the Commonwealth and Youth Olympic Games and to endorse sports and officials for the 2019 Pacific Games.

The Team PNG Performance Committee oversaw the allocation and utilisation of funding to sports with a focus on supporting those NFs on the 2019 Pacific Games program.



KRA 2: TEAM PNG GAMES SUCCESS

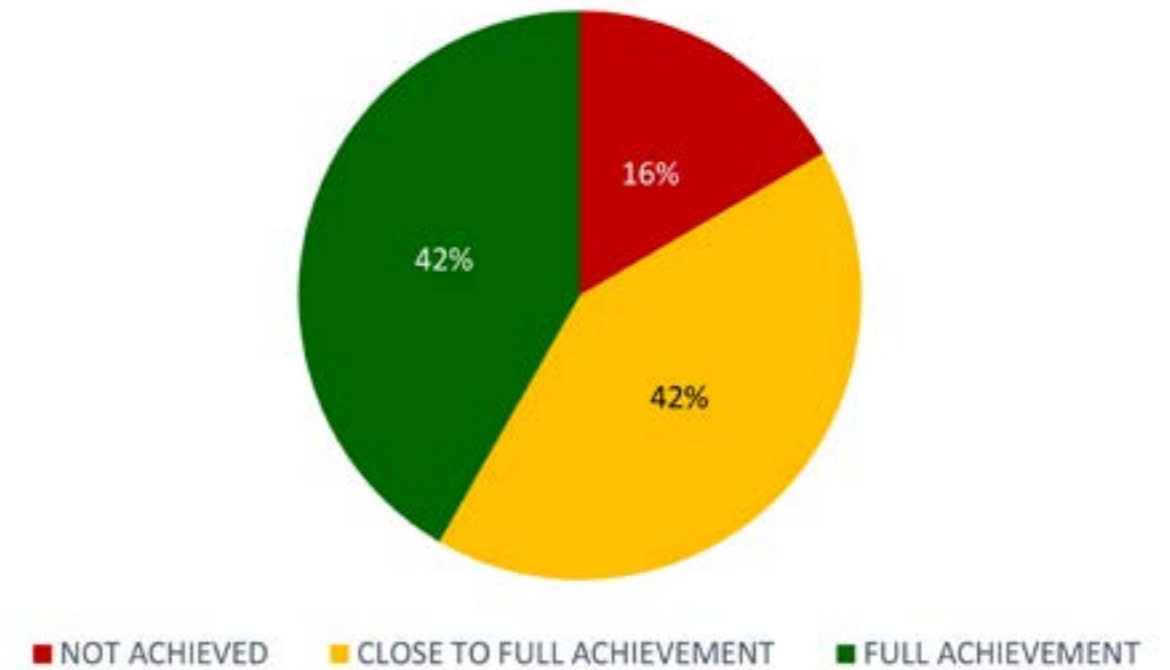
We achieved Team PNG Games Success in 2018 by having one of our proudest moments in sport when for the first time three medals were won by Team PNG at the Commonwealth Games during the Gold Coast Games in April.

All three medals came from the sport of weightlifting through PNG's champion trio, Steven Kari, Morea Baru and Dika Toua. Kari became Team PNG's first dual Commonwealth Games gold medallist while Toua added to

her two previous Commonwealth medals won in 2006 and 2014. Baru joined our list of Commonwealth Games medallists with his silver medal.

The government showed its appreciation and support for the efforts of the athletes by offering incentives of K100,000 for a gold medal, K50,000 for silver and K25,000 for bronze at the Commonwealth Games. The incentives were presented to the medal winners on July 6 at the PNG

Olympic Committee office in Port Moresby.

Chef de Mission, Tamzin Wardley led the team of 52 athletes and 32 officials attending the Games at the Gold Coast competing in 10 of the 23 sports on offer.

Team PNG competed in Athletics (including Para-Athletics), Boxing, Lawn Bowls, Rugby 7s, Shooting, Squash, Swimming, Table Tennis (including Para-Table Tennis),

Triathlon and Weightlifting.

Para Table Tennis athlete, Vero Nime carried the PNG Flag at the Opening Ceremony and her performance along with her fellow Team PNG athletes demonstrated excellence against the best of the Commonwealth. Her fellow table tennis teammate, Geoffrey Loi became the only Pacific Island athlete to progress past the group stage of the event after winning his pool matches.



Triathlete, Rachel Sapery James became the first Pacific Islander to finish a tier one triathlon event. Our swimmers also created history when they became our first relay team to compete at a Commonwealth Games. De'Bono Paraka threw a national record in the discus event and our men's Rugby 7s team backed up from the Hong Kong 7s to compete at the Commonwealth Games.

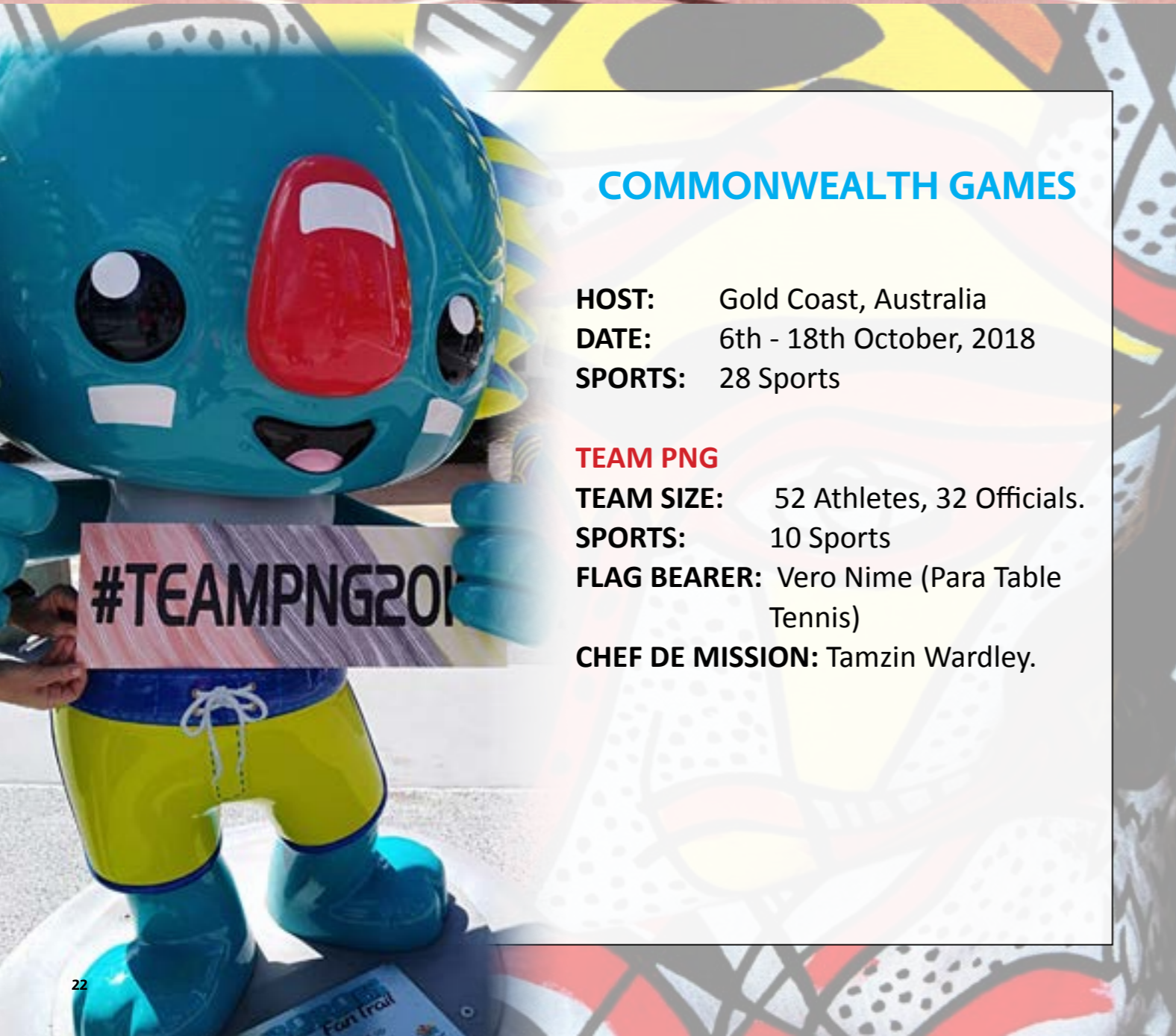
Although no medals were won, the 2018 Buenos Aires Youth Olympic Games (BAYOG) provided invaluable experience for our young team of athletes. Team PNG under the guidance of Chef de Mission, Karo Lelai, competed at BAYOG, which was held in the capital city of Argentina from October 6 to 18.

A team of three athletes and six officials attended the YOG with Natalie Mok and Terence Coleman competing in golf while Leonard Kalate was the lone male competitor in swimming. Kalate who was also part of Team PNG to the Commonwealth Games earlier in the year was given the honour of being our BAYOG flagbearer. It was the first time for Team PNG

to have Golf athletes as part of our Youth Olympic Games contingent.

Our latest YOG athletes grew from their BAYOG experience with PNG's Young Change Maker, James Leia ensuring the athletes took part in the various Cultural Education Program activities.

With new friendships developed, valuable elite level competition experience gained and the memories from Argentina, the Youth Olympic Games continued to provide a great games experience for our young athletes.

Leia was also part of PNG's delegation which attended the historic Olympism in Action Forum immediately prior to the BAYOG.

The Forum was attended by over 2,000 participants representing organizations from within the Olympic Movement and those that work in areas the International Olympic Committee is focused on as part of its Agenda 2020.

The target to win the Pacific Games on foreign soil is indeed a challenge in the absence of the same level of government funding support that

was experienced in the lead up to the 2015 Pacific Games. We have been diligent in targeting the limited resources supporting sports in their preparations to contribute towards Team PNG's games target for 2019.

In preparation for the next Olympic Games, five (5) athletes were awarded Tokyo 2020 Olympic Scholarships to assist their efforts to qualify for the Olympic Games. We are hoping Dika Toua, Morea Baru, Samuel Seghers, Rellie Kaputin and Toea Wisil will achieve their Olympic dream.

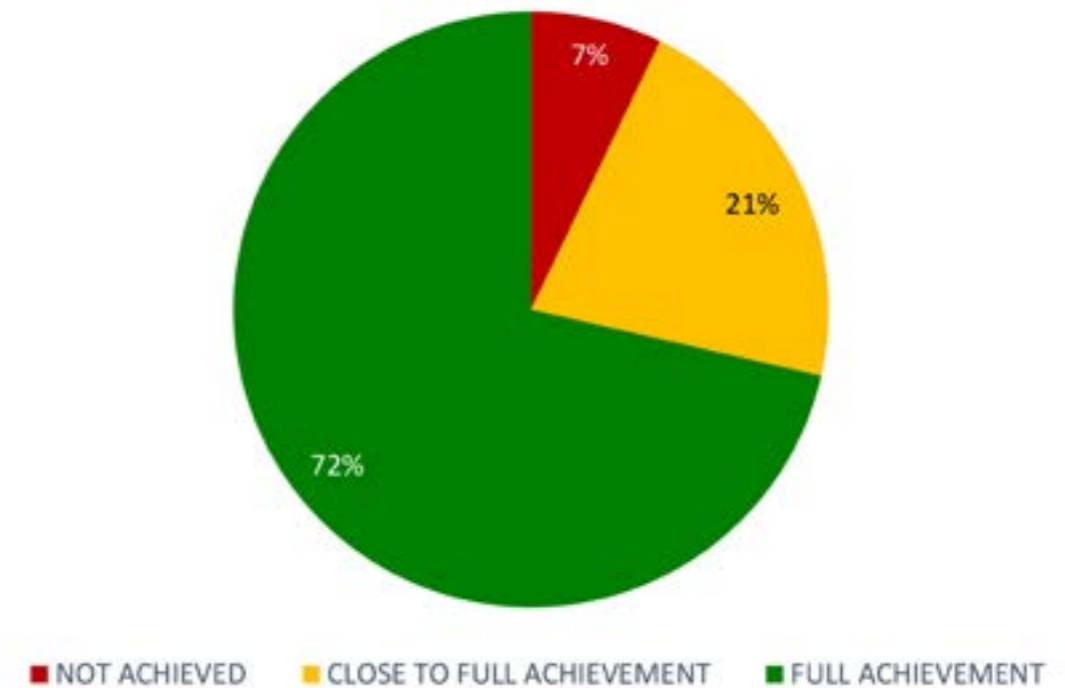
Work with PNGSF was highlighted by our active involvement in the development of the new National Sports Policy.

As a member on the Sports Policy Steering Committee I was pleased to see significant progress made on the new policy.

As part of the process of developing a new National Sports Policy, PNGOC produced a position paper based on input from National Federations and our internal working group. Funding was secured from Olympic Solidarity to support the consultative process of the sports policy development.

Also on the policy front, PNG has

been part of the Pacific Sports Compass program and PNGOC supported the staging of two civil society organisations' consultative workshops which provided input into the regional submission to the Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat which will hopefully lead to a regional sports policy.

Our continued collaboration with the International Olympic Committee (IOC) and Olympic Solidarity, Oceania National Olympic Committees

(ONOC), Commonwealth Games Federation (CGF) and Pacific Games Council (PGC) remained a focal part of support for our work.

President, Sir John Dawanincura was awarded Commonwealth Games Federation Life Membership at the CGF General Assembly held during the Gold Coast Commonwealth Games.

PNGOC was proud to have Karo Lelai, an Executive Board member

and PNG Athletes Commission and ONOC Athletes Commission Chairperson, voted in as the Chairperson for Association of National Olympic Committees (ANOC) Athletes Commission.

Lelai and her fellow PNG Athletes Commission members continued to represent the views of the athletes in the third year of their term.

The PNG Athletes Commission held its annual Athletes Forum with

important information shared with athletes on the recently released IOC Athletes Declaration, as well as other important topics for athletes including athlete safeguarding and anti-doping.

At a national level PNGOC also continued in its role as PNG focal point for the Australian Government funded Pacific Sports Partnerships program (PSP).

This year saw the PSP enter an

interim phase with several sports receiving support to continue their initiatives and the good sport for development work they are doing.

2018 also saw PNGOC expand its domestic network by joining a group of youth focused organisations to form the Youth Coalition.

Work with the Youth Coalition will allow us to ensure we have a voice on

influencing discussion around issues which affect our young athletes.

While we continue to explore opportunities to expand our stakeholder base to achieve our organizational outcomes, we were pleased to renew partnership with all of our sponsors, a relationship we value for the benefit of PNGOC and Team PNG.



KRA 4: ENHANCING OUR NATIONAL FEDERATIONS

Enhancing the capacity and capability of National Federations is an ongoing area of focus for PNGOC with specific emphasis on strengthening NF governance and compliance.

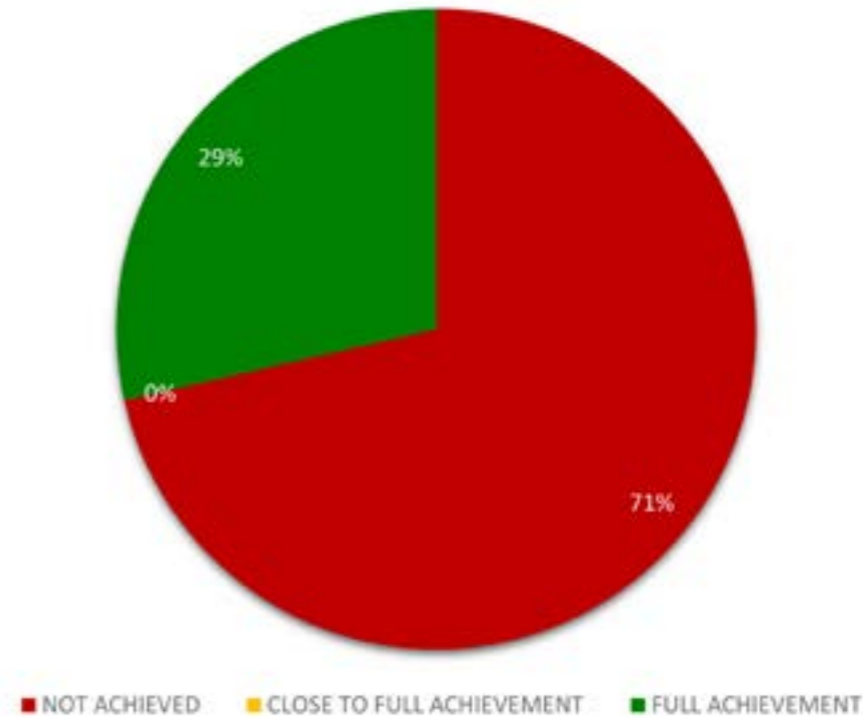
A Governance and Compliance officer was recruited to focus on this key result area and map out priorities in the remaining two years of our strategic plan in not only improving governance and compliance but to also explore and provide services to

NFs in the area of data management for storage of accounts, data and key information.

The Oceania Sport Education Program (OSEP) was delivered targeting courses for administrators, coaches, team managers and educators.

A super week of OSEP courses were delivered by PNGOC in conjunction with fellow OSEP training provider, the PNG Sports Foundation.

Also delivered in 2018 was the second edition of the PNG Managing of Olympic Sports Organisations (MOSO II), which saw several NF executives undertake the program.

PNGOC also delivered the first of three Team PNG Elite Performance Coach Education Program course workshops for the first time to national team coaches.

The program is the project of PNGOC Performance Coordinator, Chris

Amini as part of his participation in the United States Olympic Committee International Coaching Enrichment Certificate Program which saw him spend time at the US Olympic Committee's headquarters in 2018.

Along with developing their sports, our NFs also focused efforts on preparing athletes for the 2019 Pacific Games and the Tokyo 2020 Olympics.

PNGOC continues to provide funding support to our NFs to assist with their



sporting activities. Olympic Solidarity support was utilised to support the following initiatives in 2018:

- Participation at Oceania Senior and Junior Weightlifting Championships,
- Participation at Oceania Judo Championships and Australian Open,
- Participation at Oceania Swimming Championships,
- Participation at Oceania Table Tennis Series event,
- Support of Athletics Coaching Program and National Team Training Camp,
- Support to National Federations to attend regional meetings ,
- Delivery of OSEP courses,

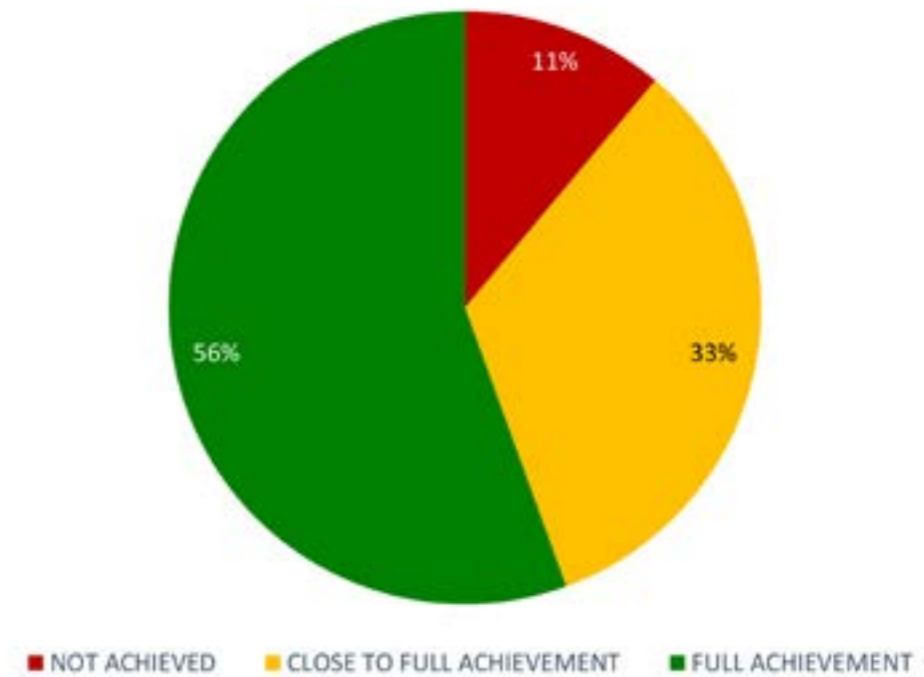
We want our Team PNG HERO athletes to be positive influences and future leaders. We want the next generation of athletes to look at our elite athletes that have followed

organisation’s flagship programme for athletes, Team PNG HERO. Twenty-one male and female athletes from various sporting codes attended the training and several of our new Team PNG HERO athletes have already taken on their athlete role model responsibility and delivered HERO activities throughout the nation.

In 2018 PNGOC delivered OVEP and LYC sessions in Port Moresby, Lae, Wewak, Goroka, Mt. Hagen

and the Southern Highlands. The OVEP program was also delivered as part of our week-long set of activities as part of the Olympic Day celebrations. School visits lead into a sports demonstration event which also included the display of Olympic Values themed student artwork.

The culmination of the celebrations was the first ever Olympic Day Relay of Unity, where 387 participants took part in a day-long relay event symbolizing the power of sport to

bring people together in a non-competitive way and the importance of physical activity.

HERO athletes also spread the message of ‘Be A Leader, Play True, Play Safe’ and ‘Go Green’ by delivering VOA sessions at the Under 18 Oceania Hockey Youth Olympic Qualifiers held in Port Moresby, the Oceania Swimming Championships, Under 15 FIBA-Oceania Championships, National Netball Championships, National

Squash Championships and a Golf training camp.

Four athlete students, Betty Angula – Basketball, Cosmas Saliawali – Karate, Moha Mea – Beach Volleyball, Shanna Dringo – Netball, benefited from the Athlete Excellence Scholarship program.

IBS University’s educational scholarships have provided much needed support to equip our athletes for life after sport.

CONCLUSION

There were also moments of hardship and loss, not just for the PNG Olympic Committee but the country as a whole.

This began with the 7.5 magnitude earthquake in Hela and Southern Highlands Provinces that destroyed, homes and properties as well as loss of lives. PNG Olympic Committee committed itself to supporting the relief effort through proceeds from the sales of Team PNG merchandise for the Commonwealth Games. It was a sad moment for the organization and for the nation as well when Life Member and former long term President of the PNG Olympic Committee, Sir Henry ToRobert passed away on October 18.

Sir Henry was the first Governor of the Bank of Papua New Guinea who took on the reigns as President of the PNG Olympic Committee from 1980 to 2000 and then again from 2003 to 2012 and was made a life member of the organization. Sir Henry was

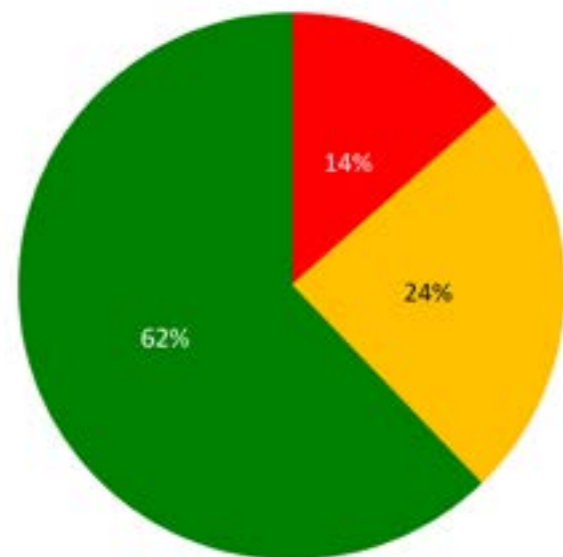
well respected for his time at the helm as he guided PNGOC through a series of significant milestones and his leadership was vital to our organization's evolution.

Sir Henry ToRobert 1942 - 2018



Life Member and former President of the Papua New Guinea Olympic Committee, Sir Henry ToRobert passed away in October, 2018.

Sir Henry was President of the PNG Olympic Committee for 29 years. He first held the role from 1980 to 2000 and then from 2003 to 2012. On his retirement he was awarded Life Membership with the organisation. Sir Henry was also involved with the sport of Softball.

As the head of the Board in the then PNG Sports Federation & National Olympic Committee (PNGSFOC), Sir Henry led the participation of Team PNG

at numerous Pacific, Commonwealth and Olympic Games.

He is remembered as a man of integrity who provided strong leadership for the organization which set the foundation for a lot of its successes.

Apart from his affiliation to sport, Sir Henry is a notable figure in Papua New Guinea history having been the first Governor of the Bank of Papua New Guinea. He held the position for 20 years (1973-1993) making him one of the longest serving governors in the Commonwealth.



Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Papua New Guinea Olympic Committee Inc. (the "Committee").

In our opinion the accompanying financial statements of the Committee are in accordance with the Association Incorporation Act (Chapter 142), including giving a true and fair view of the Committee's financial position as at 31 December 2018 and of its financial performance for the year ended on that date.

The financial statements comprise the:

- statement of financial position as at 31 December 2018;
- statement of comprehensive income;
- statement of cash flows for the year then ended; and
- notes including a summary of significant accounting policies.

Basis for Opinion

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Papua New Guinea Olympic Committee Inc. is an association domiciled in Papua New Guinea. The address of the associations' registered office is at Sir John Guise Stadium Port Moresby, National Capital District Papua New Guinea. The association's principal activity is a non-government organization that represents the interests of its members, the National Sports Federations.

The Papua New Guinea Olympic Committee Inc. includes the National Olympic Committee, The Commonwealth Games Association, The Pacific Games Association, and the Fund Raising Committee.

The financial statements were approved at the Executive Committee Members Meeting held on the 13th June 2019.

(a) Subsidiary

The Papua New Guinea Olympic Committee Inc. owns 100% of the PNG 2015 Pacific Games Organising Committee, PNG 2015 Pacific Games Ltd. The investment in subsidiary is shown at nominal value representing value of share capital subscription.

(b) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies as determined by the Association's executive committee that is consistent with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act and the financial reporting requirements as per the Association's constitution. The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis applying the accrual accounting concept.

Special purpose financial statements

This is a special purpose financial report for the sole purpose of providing financial information to the members and must not be used for any other purpose.

The association is an exempt organization in accordance with Section 171 of the Companies Act 1997 as the members have elected to be exempt under Section 171 (1b).

(i) Presentation of financial statements

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements, and have been applied consistently by the Association.

(ii) Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the exchange rate at the date of the transaction. Foreign currency monetary assets and liabilities are translated at the exchange rate at the balance date. Resulting exchange differences are recognised in the profit and loss account for the year. Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currency are recorded at the exchange rate at the date of the transaction.

(iii) Property, plant and equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are stated at original cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation is provided on cost amount of all fixed assets, including buildings so as to write off the assets progressively over their estimated useful lives. Fixed assets are first depreciated in the year of acquisition.

The straight line method of depreciation is used and the rates of depreciation used are :

(iv) Impairment

The carrying amounts of all assets are reviewed at each balance date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment.

(v) Inventories

Sports wear and accessories purchased for past Olympic, Commonwealth and Pacific Games, but not yet used are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(vi) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation as a result of a past event, and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation.

(vii) Taxation

The association is exempt from income tax under Section 27(b) of the PNG Income Tax Act as a sporting body.

(viii) Revenue

The major source of revenue for the association is grants and sponsorship income. Revenue is recognised when the funds are received.

(ix) Provisional Reserve

The association allocates grants and sponsorship income to individual projects. The excess of such allocated income over expenditure are transferred from the Statement of comprehensive income into a "Provisional Reserve" and included as "Funds held in Trust" in the Statement of financial position.

OLYMPIC VALUES EDUCATION PROGRAMME

The Olympic Values Education Programme (OVEP) is an International Olympic Committee (IOC) program that integrates sporting values and physical activity into a cultural and educational framework.

Olympic Education is grounded in sport or physical education and linked with values development. Both aspects help to develop character and make society a better place.

The PNG Olympic Committee

(PNGOC) recognizes the power sport can play in nation-building and human development.

OVEP was launched by PNGOC in late 2015 in the schools and communities surrounding the LNG Plant Site in the Central province-NCD border.

The aim of the program is for Team PNG athletes to promote the Olympic Values in schools and communities and for recipients to internalize the values and demonstrate the values

in their lives resulting in positive community outcomes.

The beneficiaries of the program include schools, communities and sporting bodies.

Project areas of the PNG LNG where the OVEP has gone to include Schools, communities and sporting events in Southern Highlands, Eastern Highlands, Morobe, East Sepik and the National Capital District.

PNGOC, as a Member of IOC is the implementing agency in country to promote and coordinate the Olympic Values Education Programme (OVEP). PNGOC trains and equips national athletes through the Team PNG HERO Program to deliver OVEP.

The use of elite PNG athletes who have represented the country at major sporting events, such as the Olympics and Pacific Games, as educators provides OVEP with a fantastic medium for engaging with young adults and children.

Pedagogy sessions are based around an emphasis on the OVEP learning principles:

- Learning is an active, not a passive activity
- People learn in different ways
- Learning is both an individual and a cooperative activity
- Learning must be fun

OVEP was delivered in five provinces, National Capital District (NCD), Southern Highlands, Eastern Highlands, East Sepik and Morobe in 2018.

In East Sepik, eight schools were visited, reaching over 1,200 student participants. This visit is the first in the province and the motivation showed by the schools, indicated an interest the students had with the program.

In the Southern Highlands, schools in Ialibu, Pangia and Kagua districts took part in OVEP. Eight schools were visited, with over 1,700 participating students.

We continue to maintain our relationship with the Souths

Sports Association who have been supportive in rolling out OVEP in the province.

PNGOC through a partnership with Athletics PNG, had booth set up during the Goroka Show. This is a first for the program to be shared at a non-sporting event that had mass attendance from the public.

The booth had over a thousand participants passing through, with mainly school-aged children taking part.

In NCD, OVEP was delivered in schools as part of the Olympic Week celebrations and during national and international sport tournaments. Five schools were visited with just over 710 students participating in

the sessions.

A highlight for OVEP in NCD would be the delivery of the program at the University of Papua New Guinea as part of the Civics & Ethics course, under the School of Humanities and Social Sciences. The program tied in well with Greek Philosophy and Values, a topic in the Civics & Ethics Course. PNGOC is now looking at establishing a long-term partnership with the University to promote Olympic Values at tertiary level.

OVEP continues to be shared at national, regional and international sporting events in the country. OVEP was delivered as part of the “Voices of the Athletes” at the Oceania Hockey Youth Olympic Games Qualifiers, Oceania Swimming Championships, National Volleyball Club Championships, National Squash Championship and the Oceania Under 15 Basketball Championships.

With the extension and the greater reach of the program, we are always building capacity for new athletes to be engaged. The third batch of the Team PNG HERO training in 2018 had 23 athletes who are now trained and equipped to deliver OVEP. The training was fully funded by ExxonMobil through the OVEP Grant. The athletes not only gained training

OVEP trip to Southern Highlands Province, to the schools in the districts of Ialibu-Pangia and Kagua has brought about a number of experiences from the participants.

The following are testimonies from participants, expressed in their own words.

Mr Mambo, Principal of Ialibu Lutheran Primary School in an interview, shared his experience on the importance

of learning the Olympic Values in school. "These three values are important, as nowadays these values are lacking in schools.

As the Principal of the school, I'm thinking of in-servicing teachers or briefing them to reinforce these three values in their classrooms," said Mr Mambo.

Jordan, a grade seven student said, "Today, I learn many things. You athlete team came

to our school and taught us many things. Now I will learn to respect my class teachers, learn to respect my sports team mates. This is a part of life that you guys taught us, and we don't use these values in our society."

Stephanie, a grade six student said, "in my community or wherever I go, I think I should maintain the practice that you guys have gave us this afternoon. I think this is the best thing we should learn."

PAPUA NEW GUINEA SPORT EDUCATION TRAINING & DEVELOPMENT PROJECT 2018

A total of eight courses were supported with the grant fully supporting the OSEP Super training week which included the 8 courses delivered making it a total of 16 courses with 260 participants.

In 2019, the OSEP Team Building and the full Managing in Sport Organizations is expected to be

delivered along with the OSEP community-based courses.

OSEP PNG takes this opportunity to thank the Papua New Guinea Olympic Committee for its support with securing the grant to enable the successful implementation of the activities of OSEP 2018.

SUMMARY

The best highlight of 2018 is seeing the keen interest in a few innovative and visionary National Federations take ownership of OSEP and deliver it to their own members whilst opening training to other sporting interests to join in. This has been through the active building of partnerships on the basis of common ground shared. Netball Papua New Guinea continues to lead with its desire as the largest female organization in the country with the Oceania Table Tennis national federation's support to its member affiliate.

127 participants in OSEP Super training; 66 with Netball, 31 with Cricket PNG, 17 with Port Moresby Hockey and 19 with PNG Table Tennis.

From 2017's 83 participants to 2018's 260 participants from 15 national federations (27%) out of 48 sports in Papua New Guinea led to an increase of more than 100 percent in 2018 demonstrating growing interest in OSEP courses.

Its dynamic learning proving valuable as it compels participants to taking action. This growth is also due to the tacit emphasis by the PNG Olympic Committee to set minimum standards of qualification and currency for all intending candidates for positions in both technical and management capacity on Team PNG.

A real big plus from this training is that Sports Education in Papua New Guinea has been revamped through the Oceania Sport Education Program.

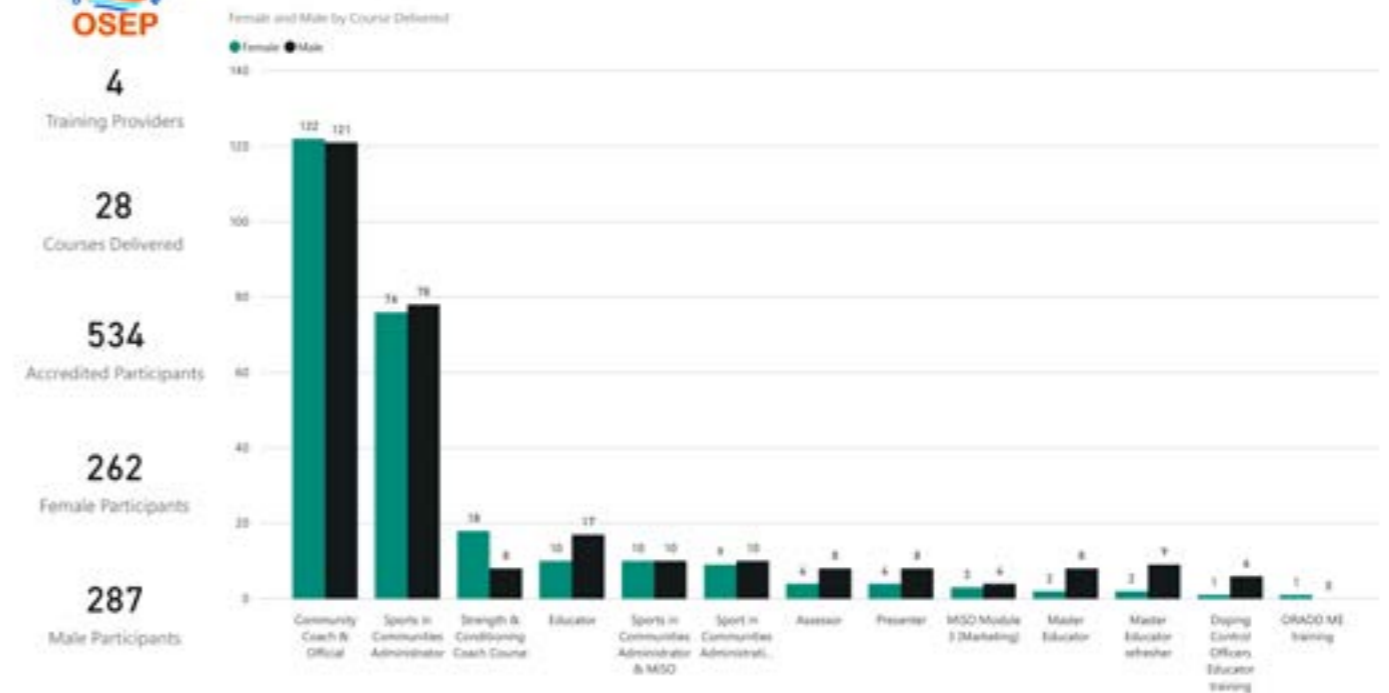
Supporting a real boost also is the current discussions on the National Sports Policy review with hopes for this policy to be in place by 2019. It has been noted that much data needs to be collected, assessed and recorded.

PNGOC is determined to develop its function as a training provider and develop a database on all sports training and sports trainers to begin the critical process of mapping out sport education, training and development in the country.

MOSO PNG II 2018 – SUMMARY

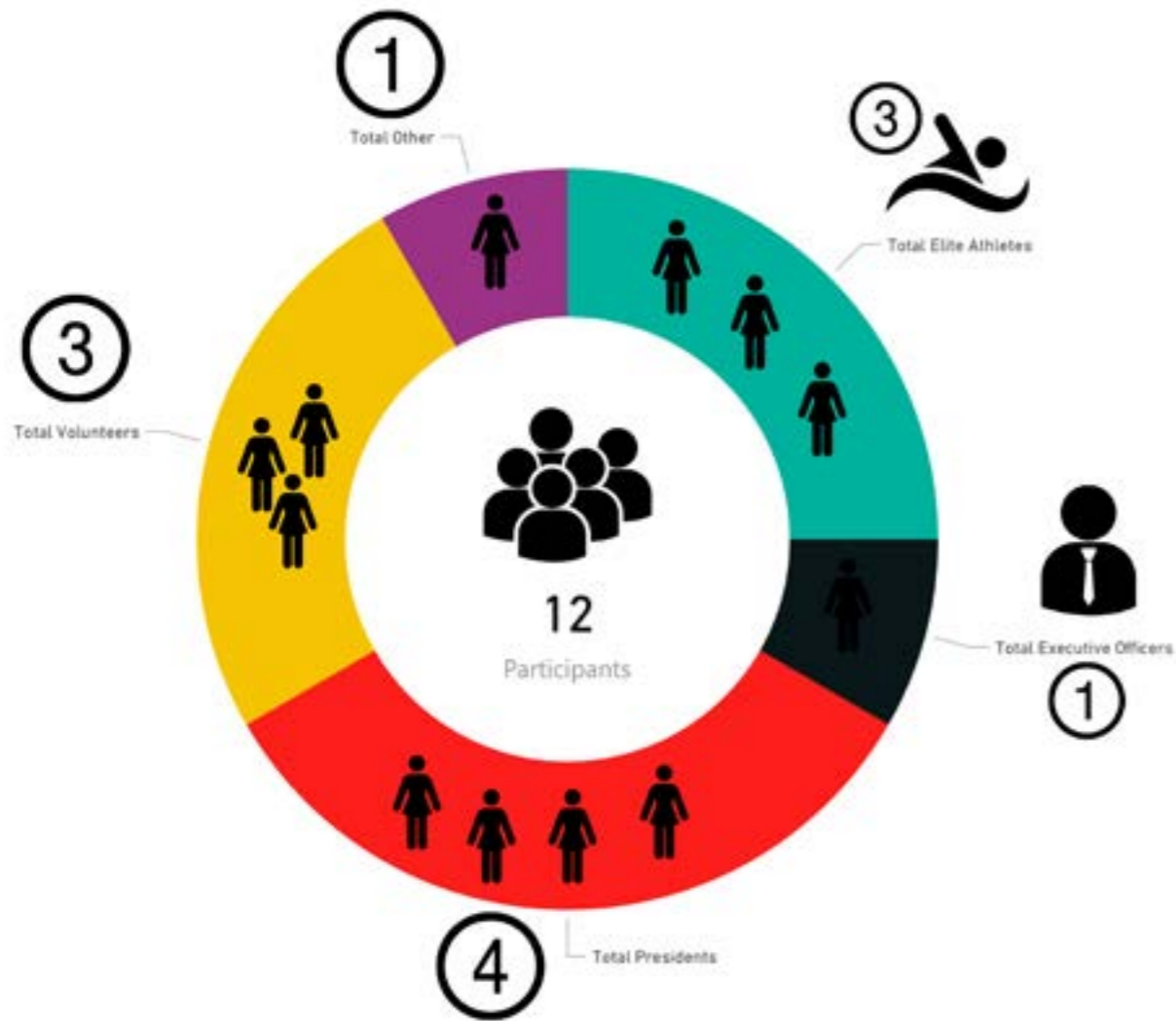
There was a good mixture of participants in the 2018 MOSO II intakes.
